"Returns from the 1948 Christmas Seal totaled \$29,478.04 on Christmas Day," Mrs. Mabel Mc-Cullough, Seal Sale Chairman for the Lake County Tuberculosis Association announced today. "This sum represents 70 per cent of the quota \$42,000 which is the minimum necessary to carry out the 1948 tuberculosis prevention and control program of the association," Mrs. McCullough ex-

"Although the Seal Sale officially closed on December 25, the work of the Lake County Tuberculosis Association is a year round project," she added, "and funds received after Christmas are just as welcome and helpful as those received during the holiday sea-

"We know that many county residents have delayed answering their Seal Sale letters because they have been busy with other Christmas preparations, but we urge all who have not yet responded to get their contributions in the mail at their earliest conven-

"We are sincerely grateful to appeal. Their prompt response means that they want the activities of the tuberculosis association to continue, since the association received its sole support from the sale of Christmas Seals."
