The Tuckers will also visit with their niece and her family, the J. Hal Reeders. The Reeders are also former Highland Parkers.

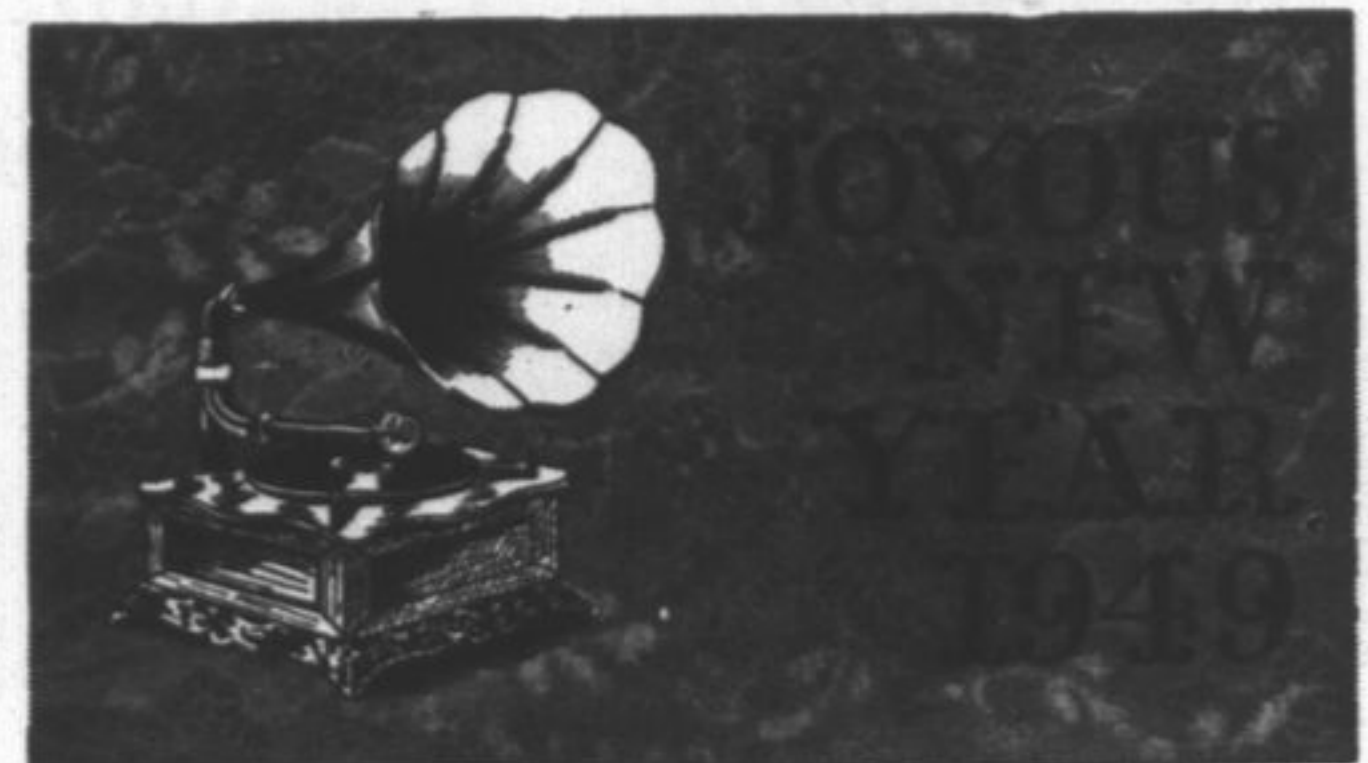
**MARY UGOLINI WEDS**
