Mrs. McCullough said that she wished to emphasize that carrying out of the Lake County Tuberculosis Association's program depended on Seal Sale returns. She added that the association, in its work of tuberculosis prevention and control, was anxious to get started on its tuberculin testing program in the country schools as well as its chest x-ray surveys for the industries of the country.

"The association is confident that it can bank on the support

of the people of Lake County to make possible its 1949 projects which are aimed against one of the most serious health menaces in this country."
