The Committee met and arranged for Mr. Stannard Baker, of the Northwestern University Institute of Traffic and Safety, who is safety engineer and is endorsed by the National Safety Council, to make a study of our traffic problems and advise us where an adult crossing guard should be placed. He made such a survey and rendered a written report to the Committee in which he advised us to place our guard on the corner of Roger Williams and St. Johns. The Committee has also found an adequate man for the job. The Highland Park Police Department will furnish him with a uniform in order that he may have the look of authority and command the respect of both children and adults.

The only remaining task is for the Committee to raise the necessary funds for the payment of this crossing guard. Therefore, you are hereby requested to subscribe generously and promptly to the establishment of this fund.
