"Modern Fairy Tales" By Florence Anderson

At hand is a small book entitled Modern Fairy Tales, written by Florence E. Anderson, and published by the Christopher Publishing House, 1140 Columbus Avenue, Boston, Mass. It is "written for children of the new generation" and dedicated to "crippled children everywhere", and consists of several short stories of an imaginative nature.

Recognizing the love of a child for the fantastic, the author has introduced the little reader to the aspen, the elm, the basswood and many others as they opened their hearts in "The Talking Leaves" to Tommy and Kay, who were gathering nuts for a very special recipe for walnut fudge.

The "Runaway Pies and the Rainbow" is a story of ten little elves and their search for the pot of gold.

Hosts at the Fairies' Annual Ball were the brownies, who include elves, in their "brown trousers, green jackets and little red-feather caps", nymphs, sprites and dryads. Their guests were "all the woodland creatures", including flowers, birds and even fireflies, who obligingly lighted the guests to their homes after the party.

The adventures of The Cracked Teapot began when, shortly after midnight, the Cracked Cup "plumped himself right down in the center of it all". Peppermint Row was born when a boy named Smutsy and a girl called Putsey decided to build a play castle in a large oak tree.

Gray Squirrel and White Slipper is the appealing title of a story about a little boy named Tema, who "just could not pass up any mud puddles". There is also a nice bit of whimsy about Father Tree and Mother Snow Putting the Leaves to Bed.

The little book includes stories about Christmas, told after the modern manner, about a tiny cowboy and a red rocking horse, Jack Frost and several others.

The YWCA building at 374 Laurel has long been a center at which different groups of women may hold their meetings. One of the oldest of these groups is the Mothers' Club. It meets on the second Tuesday evening of each month, and the program pertains to something of interest to mothers and their homes. Sometimes a trip is the order of the evening, sometimes a dinner or card party.

The Pi Delta Club is a group of business and professional women. It meets on the evening of the second Wednesday of the month. Programs are varied, and consist of speakers of current topics, book reviews, trips and dinner meetings. This club has been in existence about 15 years.

The Friendship Club, composed of girls employed in Highland Park homes has been in existence about 26 years. This fun-loving group meets the first Thursday in the month, and programs usually take the form of some entertainment.

About 10 years old is the Saturday Evening Club, meeting the 3rd Saturday of the month for dancing or bridge. It is composed of married couples.

The North Shore Creative Writers have been meeting for about 10 years. This is a workshop group, held every Thursday from 10 to 12 a.m. Studies are made of prose and poetry, and manuscripts of members of the club are submitted to the class for constructive criticism. At present Marjorie Peters of Chicago is the leader of the group.

The Dunbar Club, named for the great American colored poet, Paul Lawrence Dunbar, meets the first Tuesday of each month. This is an active and progressive group, made up of women employed in Highland Park homes, and entertainment takes the form of educational programs and parties.

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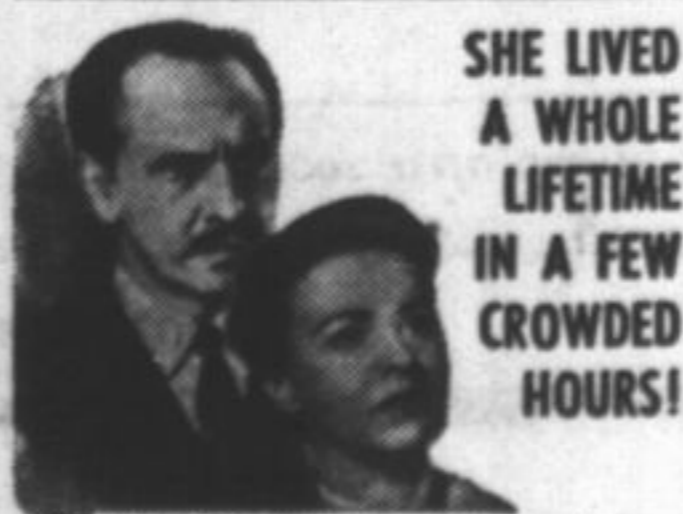
