Your Income Tax

Article No. 18

What Constitutes Taxable Income (continued)

Recently there appeared a partial list of sources of taxable income, and since there are other sources of income to many citizens it is necessary to call them to your attention. One of the most popular forms of advertising by many corporations is that of guessing contests, written or verbal. If you win a cash award, the full amount must be reported as income. If you win merchandise, jewelry or household equipment you must report as income the market value of the goods you receive. If you win a trip by plane, boat or train with all expenses paid at a hotel upon arrival at your destination, you must report the regular rates for such travel and hotel expense as income.

All gambling winnings in excess of the losses from gambling must be reported. Uncle Sam is very much interested in income whether from a legitimate source or not, since all income is fully taxable regardless of the source. You may never claim a deduction on your return the excess of the personal. But you may claim gambling losses, over your gambling gains. Such loss is entirely gambling losses which are offset by an equal amount of gambling gains.

The winnings from football, baseball, hockey, horse racing and other types of pools less the amount you invested in such pools are taxable.

The houses, automobiles, furs and other items or cash you win through purchase of chances less the cost of the chances you purchased during the year are taxable. The winnings of articles other than cash must be reported at the fair market value less the cost of the chances purchased.

The revenue officers keep their fingers on lists of winners of sweepstakes, contests, etc., since many people fail to realize these winnings are taxable. So save yourself the embarrassment of penalty for failure to report such income. And, of course, you must also remember that if you receive income from such sources in excess of \$100.00, you are liable for filing an estimated tax return if your total amount of income from all sources exceeds \$600.00, the new exemption allowance.

There is one exception to this rule and that is for winners of the Pot of Gold radio program. Since these winners render no service or competition and merely answer the telephone, the prize is considered a gift.

Article No. 19

What Constitutes Taxable Income—(continued)

We know that co-operation on the part of citizens in reporting income correctly can be depended upon. In the two preceding articles we spoke of income which is fully taxable, although not subject to either social security or withholding tax. There are additional types of taxable income. Among these are the profit you make on the sale of your home, automobile or other personal property of any kind.

You are taxable on your full earnings before your employer deducts the withholding tax, social security, and any amounts you may authorize him to withhold from your pay for union dues, pensions, contributions to charity or employee benefit funds or payment toward purchase of Government bonds.

The Federal withholding tax withheld by your employer from your earnings is deductible as credit against income tax liability, so be sure to attach all the Forms W-2 indicating income and the amount withheld, in order to verify your credit on Form 1040 or Form 1040A.

Any excess of prepayments will be refunded or credited to your 1949 declaration of estimated tax, if you must file one because you have income in excess of \$100.00 from sources other than salary or wages and if your income from all sources is in excess of \$600.00.

Careful filing of returns eliminates the necessity for later adjustment that can cause loss of time and possible assessment of additional tax.
