Mrs. Ralph Church Heads Congressional Club

Mrs. Ralph Church, wife of Rep. Church (R) of Illinois, was on Wednesday, Jan. 19, elected President of the Congressional Club of Washington, a club founded in 1908 by Act of Congress for wives and daughters of members of the Senate and House, the President's Cabinet, the Supreme Court, and women Members of Congress. The wife of the President of the United States, of the Vice President and the Speaker of the House are honorary members.

The Club has each year an active membership of over 500 and maintains the large clubhouse which it owns, with a full program of social and educational activity during the months when Congress is in session.

Mrs. Church is the first member from Illinois ever to be chosen President. She is a graduate of Wellesley college, Phi Beta Kappa, and has a master's degree in Political Science from Columbia university. She has served as president of Wellesley College alumnae association, 1940-43, as National chairman of Special Gifts committee, 75th Anniversary campaign of Wellesley College for 7 1/2 million dollars, and since 1935 has been active in Congressional Club, teaching the public speaking class for its members.
