Notice is hereby given that a Public Hearing will be held in the Council Chamber in the City Hall in the City of Highland Park, Illinois, on Tuesday the 8th day of February, 1949, at 8:00 o'clock P.M., which said Public Hearing will be conducted by the undersigned, the Zoning Committee for the City of Highland Park, designated and appointed by the City Council of the City of Highland Park for that purpose, to consider amending an ordinance entitled "The Highland Park Zoning Ordinance of 1947." in the following manner:

It is proposed that the following described property be rezoned from CLASS "E" TWO-FAMILY DWELLING DISTRICT to CLASS "F" MULTIPLE-FAMILY DWELLING DISTRICT:
All of Richards Subdivision (except the East 33 feet of lot 8 thereof) in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Ill.
Also, the east 461 feet of the south 200 feet of the north 530 feet of the N. W. ¼ of the S. W. ¼ of Section 23., T 43 N., R 12E., of the 3d P.M. in the City of Highland Park, (Except the East 230 feet thereof).

At said public hearing an opportunity will be afforded to all persons interested in the change above mentioned to be heard in relation to said proposed amendment.

LEGAL

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 9 OF ARTICLE II OF CHAPTER 17 OF THE HIGHLAND PARK CODE, BEING SECTION 370 OF THE HIGHLAND PARK CITY CODE OF 1919.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:
SECTION I. That Section 9, Article 2, Chapter 17, of the Highland Park City Code, being Section 370 of the Highland Park City Code of 1919, be and the same is hereby amended and when so amended shall read as follows:

Section 370. When any person, firm or corporation shall seek to enlarge, remodel, repair (other than ordinary replacement) or rehabilitate any existing building, or change the classification of the use thereof as classified by the City Building Code or the City Zoning Ordinances, then such building shall be made to comply in all respects and as to all portions thereof, both existing and proposed, with the provisions of the city building code as are provided at such time for the intended use thereof, provided, however, that if such building shall not be within the city fire limits as defined by ordinance, and the value or cost of such proposed enlargement, alteration, remodeling or rehabilitation shall be less than one-third of the reasonable fair market value of the existing structure, then only such portions of the building as shall be new or additional shall be required to so conform.

SECTION II. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are herewith repealed, and expressly the provisions of Section 370 of the Highland Park City Code heretofore existing be and it is hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION III. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, recordation and publication, as required by law.

Four veterans of life with an invisible rabbit are in the cast of "Harvey" starring Frank Fay and opening at the Blackstone theater, Chicago, Monday night (Jan. 31) for an engagement limited to four weeks. The original Elwood P. Dowd and his New York cast are booked for short runs in the key cities because this special coast-to-coast tour must cover the remaining territory where "Harvey" has not been seen before next Summer when the motion picture version is sched-

uled to be filmed.
Dora Clement is the featured comedienne and plays the role of the star's stage sister. She started with the original company in the part of the doctor's wife in 1944, and a year ago stepped into the Josephine Hull role which she has played in New York, Philadelphia, Washington, Boston and way stations en route to Chicago.

Fred Irving Lewis has had the assignment of the chief psychiatrist of "Chumley's Rest Home" since the Boston premiere on Nov. 17, 1944, and he too has been seeing the invisible rabbit without a break, save for one six-week vacation last Summer.
