Taxpayers frequently do not un- tributing their own cooking. derstand what constitutes taxable income and the year in which such income should be reported. There are certain types of income which Uncle Sam says are taxable during a specific taxable period, although from your point of view they may seem to be income for another period. A good phrase for you to use as a guide to help you determine the correct taxable year for reporting income is "A vailability determines your liability." When income is available it is constructively received. The following are examples of receipts which are taxable for the year when collected or credited to your account regardless of whether or not you actually get the money on your books or in your pocket.

1-Your banker credits interest to your account but you forget to bring your pass book and have the amount entered.
