Family Service Key Agency, Says Dr. Josselyn

The annual meeting of the Family Service of Highland Park was held on Monday evening, January 31, at the Highland Park Library Auditorium.

Mrs. Marian G. Fisher, Executive Secretary, reported that the agency is making strides in carrying out its primary service of case-work counseling. She introduced Mrs. Mina Kuyper, the agency's psychiatric counselor, and spoke of the intensive counseling she is doing with individuals who have personal or family problems.

She reported increased use of the agency in the cases of family relations and individual personality adjustments, but stressed the need for reaching more young children.

The business meeting concluded with the election of the following officers, directors and advisory council members for the coming year. Mr. Stanley McKee was chairman of the nominating committee. Your Income Tax

Income constructively received. Taxpayers frequently do not understand what constitutes taxable income and the year in which such income should be reported. There are certain types of income which Uncle Sam says are taxable during a specific taxable period, although from your point of view they may seem to be income for another period. A good phrase for you to use as a guide to help you determine the correct taxable year for reporting income is "Availability determines your liability." When income is available it is constructively received. The following are examples of receipts which are taxable for the year when collected or credited to your account regardless of whether or not you actually get the money on your books or in your pocket.

- 1—Your banker credits interest to your account but you forget to bring your pass book and have the amount entered.
- 2—Your agent collects rents from your property or money from your investment account at a brokerage office or collects income of any kind, but fails to remit it to you on or before the last day of the taxable year.
- 3—You fail to clip and cash the interest coupons on bonds for interest earned during the year.

In all of the following cases the money withheld is definitely taxable to the individual who owns the property or securities, etc., or to whom the salary or wages are due:

- 1—Your employer withholds from your check money for union dues, insurance, bond premiums, employee's benefit dues, contributions to Red Cross, etc.
- 2—Your employer pays directly from your salary to a third person money to discharge your indebtedness.
- 3—Your employer withholds from your salary payments for social security and withholding tax.
- 4—A divorced man stipulates (not by court order in the decree) that he wants a percentage of the income from his property given to his former wife.

The next article will list some types of nontaxable income.

Article No. 21

Non-taxable income
There are certain items of income which are not subject to Federal tax, since they are specifically exempted by laws and regulations.

The so-called dividends which you receive on your mutual life insurance policy are not taxable income, but merely represent a reduction of the cost of your protection by the company, whether you accept the cash or allow the dividends to remain with the company to purchase additional insurance. If your endowment policy has matured and the amount of money you receive is greater than the cost to you, you must report as taxable income the excess of the amount you receive over the cost.

If you receive proceeds of a life insurance policy upon the death of an insured person you do not receive this money as income.

The social security and old age benefits are not taxable.

The rental value of a home and its furnishings for the pastor of a church are not taxable. However, if he receives a special allowance in cash for his rent of quarters, this amount is considered to be additional compensation for his services and is fully taxable.

Damages paid to you for personal injury are not taxable nor are the insurance benefits you receive when sick.

Workman's Compensation and unemployment compensation are not taxable.

The interest you receive from municipal bonds or from county or state issues are also tax exempt.

Interest from \$5,000.00 of the principle of Federal bonds issued before March 1, 1941 is exempt.

Commissioned officers in the armed forces of the United States are entitled to exclude \$1,500.00 of their service pay from taxable income in 1948. The pay of enlisted men for 1948 is entirely excluded from income.

The benefits allowed for personal injuries or sickness which resulted from his or her service in the armed forces whether or not during a war are exempt from tax by a veteran.

The disability retirement pay is exempt to the veteran, but if he receives regular retirement pay it is subject to tax.

At a later date more information will be given concerning veterans.
