National Red Cross Campaign Launched In Chicago, Feb. 28

For the first time in history, Chicago will be the scene of the launching of the National Red Cross Fund Campaign, with General Dwight D. Eisenhower, president of Columbia University, as principal speaker, James E. Day, general chairman of the Chicago Chapter's 1949 Red Cross drive, announced today. Heretofore, the national campaign has been launched in the east, Day explained.

The national kick-off will be a meeting February 28, before approximately 5,000 Red Cross workers in Medinah Temple, with many national and local notables, including film actor James E. Stewart as master of ceremonies, and Mayor Martin H. Kennelly, Helen Hayes, and Wayne King. National radio hook-ups and telecasts between Chicago and the east are planned, as well as a special local follow-up program with Chicago outlets.

The program will be broadcast nationally through the facilities of the American Broadcasting Company. It is scheduled for 8:30 to 9:00 p.m. (CST) February 28, on the eve of the opening of the month-long campaign which begins March 1. The local program will continue to 9:30 p.m. President Truman will speak on the

byterian and Christian Science churches for their fine cooperation in the parking problem, providing ample space for the Fire Company to service this section.
Shrubbery on Parkways
This menace is being overcome, resulting in better visibility, an important safety factor. During the period of 1940-1945, 1000 pieces of property were cleared of shrubbery.
Grade Crossings
As the result of conferences with the Northwestern R.R., the tower at the Central avenue crossing will be raised for better vision and a signal panel board installed in the tower—an important factor in foggy weather, at a cost of about \$4000 to the railroad. The Traffic commission commends officials for their cooperation in this matter.
School Safety
This is a challenging problem, although grammar schools have provided excellent school patrols. More police and more squad cars are necessary for adequate protection, as Highland Park covers an area of 13 square miles.

The much acclaimed \$10,000 science award winner, *Mirror For Man* by Dr. Clyde Kluckhohn, is now available at the public library.
