Naval Reserve Officer Candidate Program Announced

College students who join the Organized Naval Reserve prior to March 10, 1949, or who already are enlisted members, have an opportunity to apply for commissions as Ensign, USNR. Announcement of this new program was made this week by Ninth Naval District Headquarters.

There is a new Naval Reserve Training Center in the new building at 1100 Central St., Evanston, Ill., overlooking the Evanston Community golf course. Enlisted reservists, or those who join up prior to March 10, will be eligible for commissions upon completion of their college work. This new Reserve Officer Candidate plan requires no additional work from the student while he is in college, other than satisfactory attendance at drills in his Naval Reserve unit. He carries out his normal academic schedule, and obtains training for his Ensign's commission in two interesting six-week summer periods at either Newport, Rhode Island, or San Diego, California.

Normally, the first training period comes at the end of the candidate's freshman or sophomore year, and the second at the end of his junior year. During the first period, a candidate receives \$135.00, plus longevity, quarters, meals, uniforms, medical care, and free transportation to and from home. During the second period pay increases to \$150.00, with the same allowances.

The Navy's announcement emphasized that applications must be made at once, since they must be received at District Headquarters by March 15.

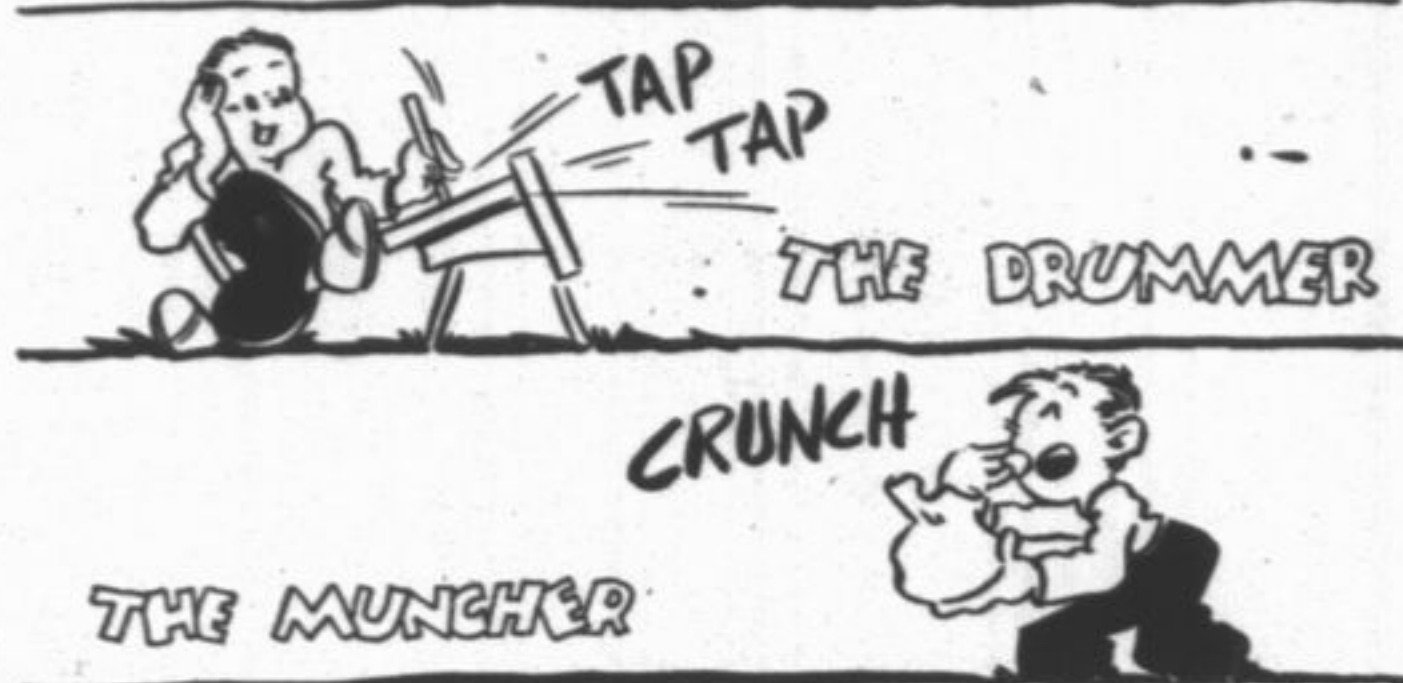
(Continued from page 1) and it is my opinion that for the good of the country as a whole, government aid should be solicited rather than opposed.
