Note that BOTH Lake Forest and Highland Park PAY MORE in high school taxes than it costs to educate their students. The District AS A WHOLE contributes the taxes that are needed to provide a high school education for ALL the children in the District.

Lake Forest, by its petition to withdraw, is attempting to shift its share of responsibility for education in the less wealthy areas of the District to its poorer neighbors, some of whom are already bearing MORE THAN THEIR SHARE!
