U. N. TO HEAR CARROLL BINDER

Viewpoints of the United States on freedom of the press will be the topic used by Carroll Binder, when he speaks before the United Nations this spring. Mr. Binder, former director of the Chicago Daily News Foreign Service, is now editorial editor of the Minneapolis Tribune. The Binders formerly lived in Ravinia. He has been nominated by Warren R. Austin, chief U. S. delegate to the U. N., as the American member of the subcommittee on freedom of information.

Mr. Binder is the only American nominee for election by the Commission on Human Rights and thus will be the American spokesman when the subcommittee meets at Lake Success in May.
