

A Fifth of America's Doctors are Trained in Northern Illinois

CHICAGO and Northern Illinois is a world center of for medical education. More doctors are trained in the area than in any other comparable community. At a conservative estimate, one doctor out of every five in the nation received part or all of his education here.

This area is a magnet for medical students because five great medical schools, with superb hospital and research facilities, age located here. Medical training is only one of the many segments of education in which Chicago and Northern Illinois is outstanding. That the city and surrounding communities form a great educational and medical center, as well as the center of an industrial empire, is important to industrialists everywhere.
