Playground Dept. **Promotes Year-Around Activities**

The Highland Park Playground and Recreation Department is a municipal tax-supported agency with a Board of five members appointed by the mayor and the City Council.

It is a year-round organization, working as an agency promoting and sponsoring community activities for young and old in Highland Park.

Recreation Department maintains the Community Center and supervises year-round activities that are carried on there such as dancing, art, baton-twirling classes and boxing, fencing and weight-lifting groups. The Center also provides facilities and meeting places for civic groups including the Community Chest, the Co-ordinating Council, the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, the Red Cross, and music groups. The Recreation Department supervises seven summer playgrounds West rear. in Highland Park and sponsors leagues in softball, basketball, touch football, hockey and other seasonal major sports.




