Keep portable appliances to a minimum... and never within reach of person occupying bathtub.

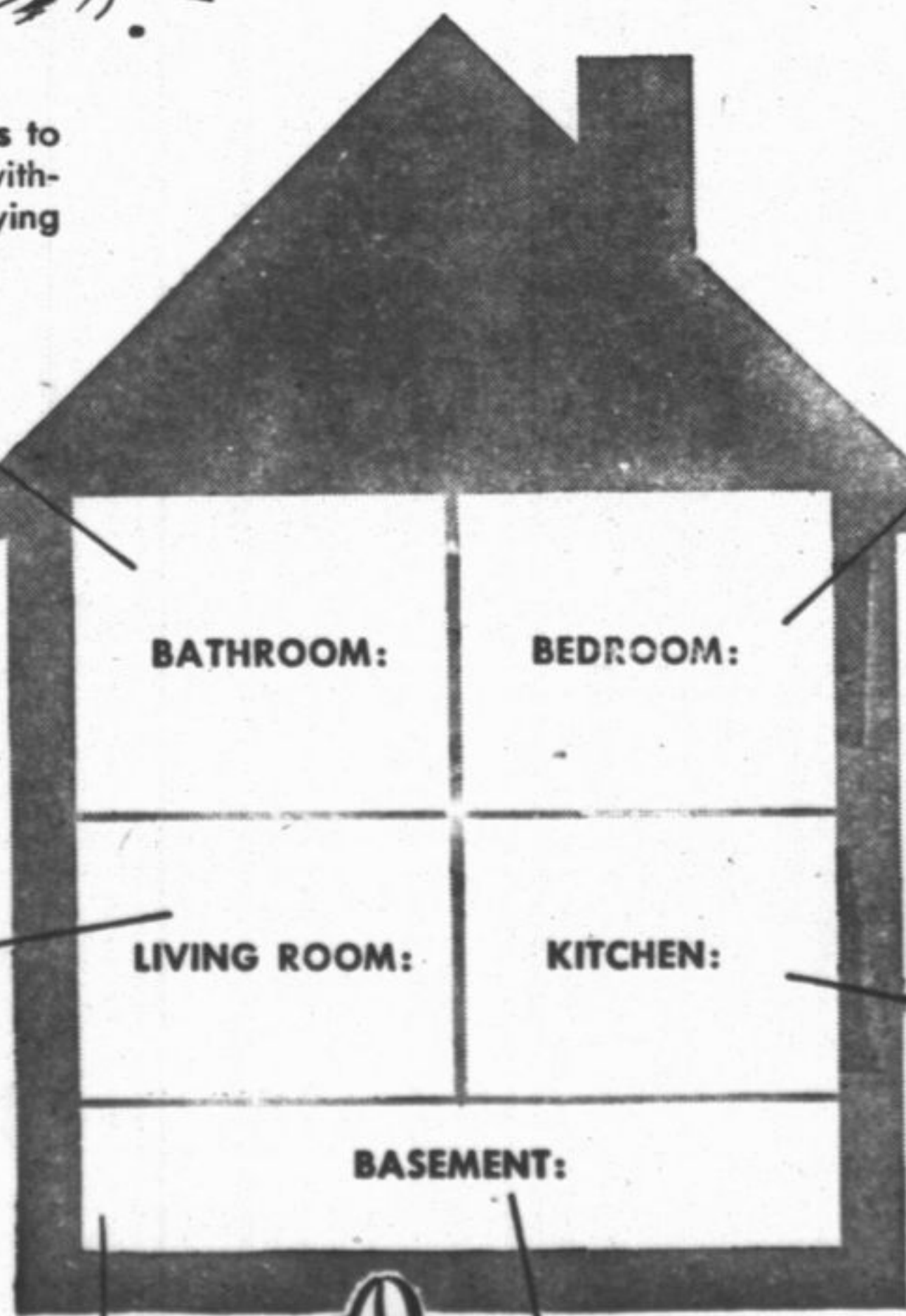
After using heating appliances, be sure they are disconnected by removing the plug from the wall outlet.
