The Oak Park team scored in every inning but the fourth and sixth to take the first game handily as Flocchi, the Little Giant hurler, seemed to have a little trouble getting into the groove. The Huskies got 9 hits and were aided by 4 Highland Park errors as they took the Blue and White to the cleaners.

The Little Giants started off in what would have seemed a walk-away for them as Heimerdinger lead off the game with a home run to put the Blue and White in the lead momentarily. However the expected power at the plate soon bogged down and the Highland Park batters were very meek for the remainder of the game. The second Highland Park run came in the top half of the seventh as Thom hit a triple and later scored on a long fly ball.
