deal of pressure put on members of the legislature against allowing a "Con-Con" resolution on the 1950 ballot. "You will note", Pearson said, "that I kept faith with the people and voted as I told them I would."  
Keller took the opposite view in explaining that he turned against the resolution because it represented a "militant minority". His favorable vote on the first test of "Con-Con", he stated, "fulfilled my pledge to the League of Women Voters." This led Mrs. Bernice Van der Vries, Winnetka representative, to ask tartly whether he had "voted for the ladies or voted on the bill."  
Defeat of the Constitutional Convention resolution, said the AVC spokesman, was a victory for obsolete laws, tax confusion and misrepresentation in the state assembly.
