The Coast Guard has abandoned its search of Lake Michigan for the light plane in which John Russell, 22, and his bride, Marilyn, 21, former Chicagoans, disappeared May 1 after a takeoff from the Northerly Island airport. The couple was headed for their home in Humboldt, Iowa. The finding of an airplane wheel and a piece of wood led to the belief their plane may have plunged into the lake. Confirmation Rites To Be Administered To 116 At Immaculate Conception

On Monday, May 30th, Decoration Day, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, the Most Reverend William Edward Cousins, D.D., Auxiliary Bishop of His Eminence, Samuel Cardinal Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago, will administer the Sacrament of Confirmation to 116 candidates in the Immaculate Conception church. His Excellency will be assisted in the ceremony by the parish clergy, and by Father Skoner, Diocesan Missionary, by Father Murphy of Deerfield and by Father Gleeson of Highwood. The liturgical music will be rendered by the Boys' and Girls' Choirs of the Immaculate Conception school.

Highwood Chosen As Permanent Home Of Wesley Methodist

Two years ago the congregations of the Highwood and the Highland Park Methodist Churches voted unanimously to merge, bringing together the people and the properties of these two organizations into the Wesley Methodist Church of Highland Park and Highwood. Last Friday night the members took another important step in the history of the church. At an all Church Conference they voted, with an overwhelming majority, to authorize the Board of Trustees to sell the Highland Park property and launch a building program to redecorate and enlarge the building on the Highwood location. Tentative plans include remodeling the sanctuary, extending the dining and recreation facilities, and building a five room parsonage adjoining the present structure.

The department of the American Legion Auxiliary of Illinois asks all units to adopt a blind veteran, whom they will keep supplied with sewn carpet rags which he may weave into rugs.

Highland Park Unit No. 145 has adopted a veteran of the first World War, at the Wood, Wisconsin, Soldier and Sailor's home, where he is a member of an all-blind company.

The women of the Unit have been meeting during the winter to cut, sew and roll carpet rags to parcel post to their adopted veteran. Cards, cookies and gifts at Christmas have brought several letters in reply, as well as a nice rug 52 inches long. He will be glad to take orders for rugs of any size.

The ladies of Unit No. 145 plan to visit Wood this summer and give a picnic for this veteran and his buddies.

It is said that the peak of the enrollment of veterans in hospitals and homes for World War I will not be reached until 1950, and for World War II, until 1975. A high price to pay for war—and for these men whose birthright is freedom and liberty.
