A speech delivered on the Floor of the House on Monday (May 16) by Congressman Ralph E. Church, (R), 13th District of Illinois, attacking the "waste and extravagance" in the work of remodeling the House Chamber and repairing the roof has caused considerable national discussion.

Mr. Church called attention to the costly buildings and expensive fence of "beautifully grained plywood with no knots" erected by the contractor in connection with the work.

Tuesday night NBC-TV televised Congressman Church in a news broadcast beside the "elegant construction lay-out", consisting of a "contractor's dream house" of several rooms and a modern office "built with the best of lumber and in accordance with the best design."

Temporary Telephone Rate Increases

In accordance with an order of the Illinois Commerce Commission of May 12, temporary telephone rate increases were submitted to the Commission today (Monday) at Springfield by the Illinois Bell Telephone Company, Manager E. M. Knox reported. The rates filed would add a penny a day to the basic classes of residence service and about 2 cents a day for business service, he said.

The Commission's May 12 ruling authorized the Company to increase its gross revenues by \$7,600,000 a year but limited the duration of the temporary rates to October 10. Illinois Bell serves 325 communities, including Highland Park, throughout the state.

Subject to approval by the ICC, the higher rates for local service, including rural and metropolitan service, would become effective with customers' bills dated June 1st and 22nd, according to Mr. Knox.

LEGAL

ORDINANCE NO. 49-9-52 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHWOOD:

Section 1. License Required. No person, firm, corporation, society, club or association shall keep and maintain for gain or profit in any place of public resort, either as owner, licensee, manager, officer or agent, any shuffleboard, unless such person, firm, corporation, society, club or association shall have first obtained a license for such purpose.

Section 2. Shuffleboard defined. The term "shuffleboard" shall mean a game played on a board or boards by a player or players who shove or drive disks into variously numbered divisions of a diagram indicated on the playing board or boards and for the playing of which game a monetary charge is made.

Section 3. Application for License. Application to maintain such shuffleboard shall be made with the City Collector of said City for license therefor, stating the full name and address of the applicant and giving the name of the owner thereof where shuffleboard is to be used and maintained. Examination of said application may be made by the Mayor, Chief of Police and License Committee of said City to determine that the applicant is of good moral character and the premises in which it is proposed that such shuffleboard device be operated is one of public resort and not habituated by criminals, felons, vagrants or persons having police records of crime or offense involving moral turpitude.

Section 4. Amount of License. An annual license fee of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) is imposed upon each "shuffleboard" used within the city for gain or profit, providing such license for shuffleboard shall be issued only to those who have obtained an operator's license from the City of Highwood, the license fee for which shall be Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) per year. All such licenses shall expire on the last day of May next after their issuance and the full license fee shall be paid no matter when such license is issued subsequent to the last day of May each year. There shall be no rebate or refund of any license, and such license shall be non-assignable and non-transferable and apply only to the premises for which license is issued.

Section 5. Gambling Prohibited. The wagering of money, goods or merchandise for gambling upon the outcome of such test of skill is expressly prohibited and shall constitute a violation of this ordinance and shall subject the licensee to a revocation of said license. The license granted under this ordinance may, in the discretion of the Mayor, be revoked should the premises be used for immoral purposes or as the congregating place of vagrants, habitual criminals, felons or persons involving moral turpitude.

Section 6. Penalty. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be subjected to a fine of not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for each offense and every day that such violation shall continue shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

would be 30 cents a month for residence customers and 50 cents for business users.

No changes were submitted in long distance rates, the manager said. However, special 5-cent rates from Chicago suburbs to nearby areas within the city would be increased to the present standard 10-cent rate. Some other suburban toll rates would also be increased.

"These rate changes affecting calls between certain suburban points and Chicago or between

suburbs are intended to iron out inequities which have existed in some cases for many years," the Illinois Bell manager declared. "A few rates are increased a nickel or more and a few are decreased a nickel. Those that were permanently increased within the last two years are untouched. As a result, all the toll rates within a 40-mile radius of Chicago would be on a uniform basis."

Increases were submitted on charges for moves or changes of telephone apparatus within a home or office and for installation of residence extensions.
