### THE CASE AGAINST SOCIALIZED MEDICINE

One of the most comprehensive explanations of what the administration's plan for compulsory health insurance would mean to this country, is contained in a small 16-page pamphlet published under the direction of the American Medical Association.

Here, in concise, factual, question-and-answer form, is a straightforward story of what a small minority of politicians and professional do-gooders will have accomplished if they are able to slip this plan on the unsuspecting or indifferent people of the United States.

Here are just a few of the important points it makes:

Who is FOR this plan? — Its backers include The President, all who seriously believe in a socialistic state, THE COMMUNIST PARTY AND EVERY OTHER LEFT-WING ORGANIZATION IN AMERICA.

What is compulsory about the plan? Only the payroll tax! There is nothing compulsory about the amount or quality of medical service the government must make available in return for the money collected.

Why do doctors generally oppose the plan? — Because it is compulsory regimentation and because the historical record of every great country that has tried politically-controlled medicine, is a record of deterioration of medical education, training and research, degeneration of medical standards and of medical care and a steady decline of the people's health.

Why does medical care suffer under "political" medicine? — Because doctors are responsible to politicians first; their patients, under such a system, come second. They are swamped with paperwork and red tape, and with patients who do not need care, as well as those who do. In England today, for example, many doctors can give an average time to each patient of only three minutes per office call.

The above are only a few of the important aspects of compulsory health insurance covered in this pamphlet.

Everyone who thinks that socialized medicine would mean more and better medical care, everyone who thinks that socialized medicine would be "free" medicine, should read this pamphlet.

And all of us, should write our congressman and leave no doubt in his mind that we want him to oppose this scheme.

### Former Highland Parker Meets Death By Accident

On May 24 William Garfield Canright, 36, of Chicago, son of Mr. and Mrs. Garfield S. Canright of 636 Linden avenue, Highland Park, met his death when crushed by a trailer truck, in a collision at the intersection of highways 59 and 68, near Wheaton.

Born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, he came to Highland Park as a high school sophomore, graduating in 1930. In 1934 he was graduated from Grinnell college, and attended Chicago medical school for one year.

During the war he served with the 921st Field Artillery under McArthur, in the medical corps, in charge of the First Aid tent, in the Philippine and Okinawa campaigns. When the war ended his company was on the road to Japan.

Besides his parents he is survived by his widow, the former Constance Clark of Grinnell, Iowa; four children, Sarah Anne, 8, Peter, 5, Katherine, 3, and Michelle, 10 months old; two brothers, John R. and George Edward, and one sister, Mrs. Raymond H. Davis.

The funeral rites were conducted on Thursday, May 26, by Reverend O'Connell, at the Immaculate Conception church.

### N. S. Citizens' Committee Elects 21-Man Board Of Directors

The North Shore Citizens' Committee, encompassing communities from Evanston to Lake Forest, announced today the election of a new twenty-one man board of directors at its annual meeting. Reading a report of the past year's activities before the membership, last year's chairman, Stanley G. Harris, Jr., of Glencoe, noted the progress of the organization toward its goal of improving the climate of public opinion on the North Shore concerning the members of minority groups.

Work with community hospitals aimed at broadening services to Negroes composed a significant proportion of the Committee's activities, Harris said. In addition, the committee had interested itself in what appeared to be a discriminatory public re-housing program in Evanston and was continuing its interest in this field. A membership education program regarding pending legislation at Springfield including proposals for a State Fair Employment Practices Commission took up a good deal of the group's attention, according to Harris.

Harris reported on the results of the Committee's investigation of an incident in one of the communities which appeared to be directed against a minority group member. The probe showed, he stated, that the incident, which involved several young boys, was inspired by a newsreel showing initiation rites of the Ku Klux Klan. With the cooperation of school and police officials, the Committee's investigation disclosed that while there was evidence of intolerance, the incident resulted mainly from a desire on
