The old are too babyish; the middle-aged are too adolescent, Dr. Frank declared.

"There's too much habitual slackness. There are too many of us who have A plus ability yet turn out C minus performances. We're living at a passable minimum. Not enough of us are rising to the height of our capacity," he continued.

The incentive to excel has gone, We're content to be average. And to be satisfied with an average performance is a definite sign of immaturity, Dr. Frank said.

A mature person is he "who has the sure and steady quality of being there. He keeps his word. He sticks to his job. He believes in desponsible living."
