Asked what special qualifications the Just brothers had as investigators, he replied, "Anyone could do it. You could do it."

Talking to a Daily News Reporter, Ward Just was quoted as saying that an appraisal ring was

in operation in Lake County before Attorney General Barrett took over; that he and his brother supported Barrett and that Barrett had asked them to recommend someone "to actively help."

He was further quoted as saying that they did considerable work which did not interfere with their newspaper duties; that they had no part of routine cases; that their object was to get as much tax as possible for the state and that his brother "enjoys" the work.

The day after the story appeared in the Daily News, the following statement by the Just brothers appeared in The Waukegan News-Sun as a part of a story headlined, "JUST BROTHERS ANSWER STORY."

"We acted as appraisers in several estate matters for the attorney general's office. All of the transactions are a matter of court record. We gather from the Chicago Daily News story that they infer the appraisals were received because we are newspapermen. The fact of the matter is we have been close friends of former Atty. Gen. George Barrett for more than 20 years.

"We suppose the purpose of the Daily News story is to infer that we received the appraisals in return for political support of The News-Sun.

"Our newspaper was no more obligated to Attorney General Barrett's office than was the Chicago Daily News or any other newspaper was obligated to support the policies of the state department because their correspondents are frequently ferried free to all parts of the globe at government expense."

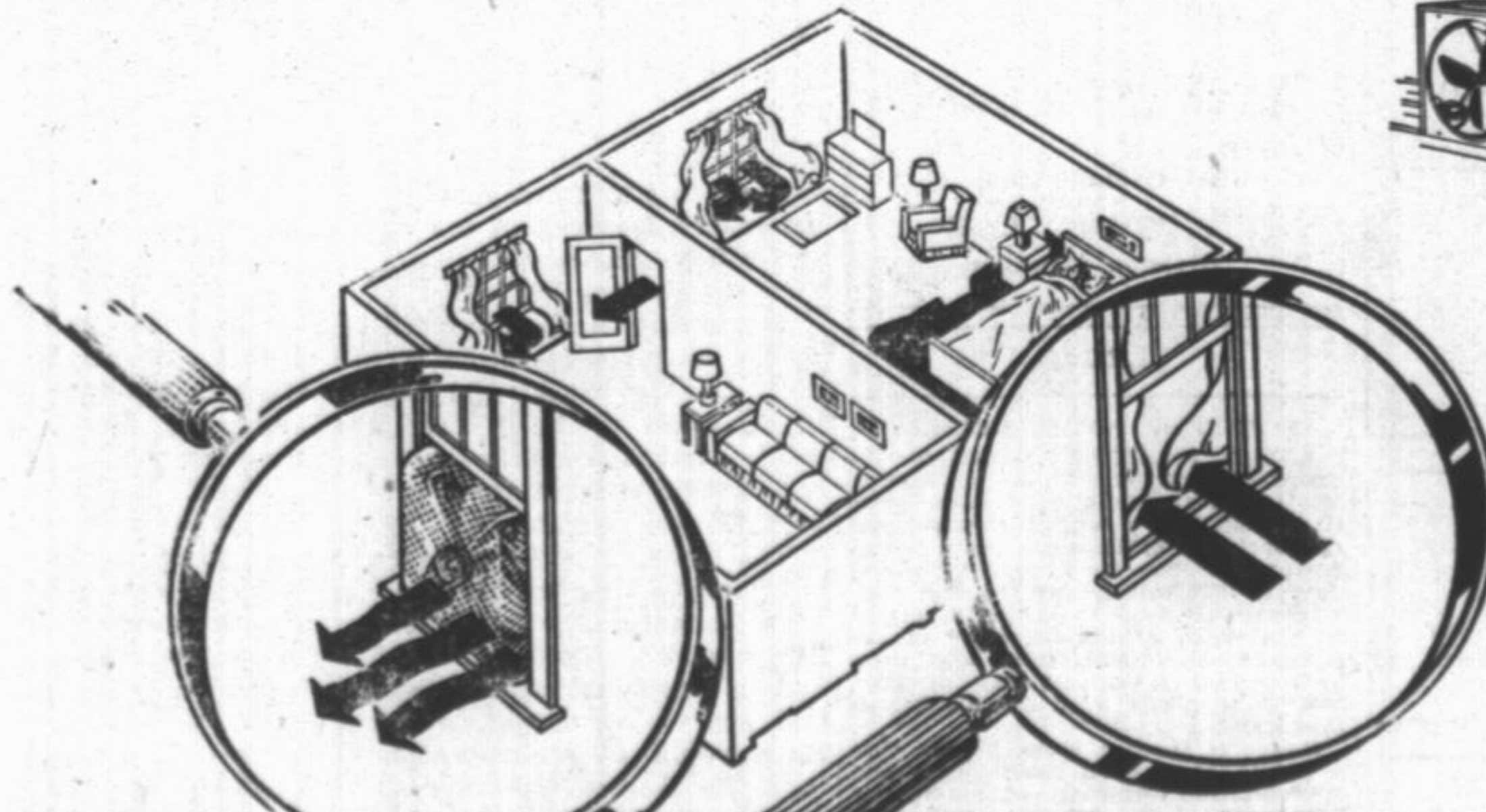
