Memorial Services For War Hero, Sgt. Charles Clark

Memorial services were held on Saturday of last week at the Immaculate Conception church for Sgt. Charles A. Clark, who gave his life for his country at the age of 28 in a raid over Germany, October 10, 1943.

Born in Highland Park and a graduate of Highland Park High school, he entered the army in March, 1942, receiving his training at posts in Florida and Wyoming. Shipping overseas in May, 1943, he was stationed in England.

A member of the 100th bomber division and of the 418th bomber squadron, he flew many missions over Germany, and also conveyed flying fortresses to Africa. He was awarded the distinguished flying cross, the air medal with four oak leaf clusters, the presidential citation and the purple heart.

Surviving are his father, William E. Clark of Chicago; three brothers, Norman and James of Vancouver, Washington, and Michael of Chicago, and three sisters: Mrs. Charles Zahnle of Highland Park, Mrs. Homer Chase of Lake Forest and Mrs. Howard Olson of Chicago.

Interment was made at St. Mary's cemetery.

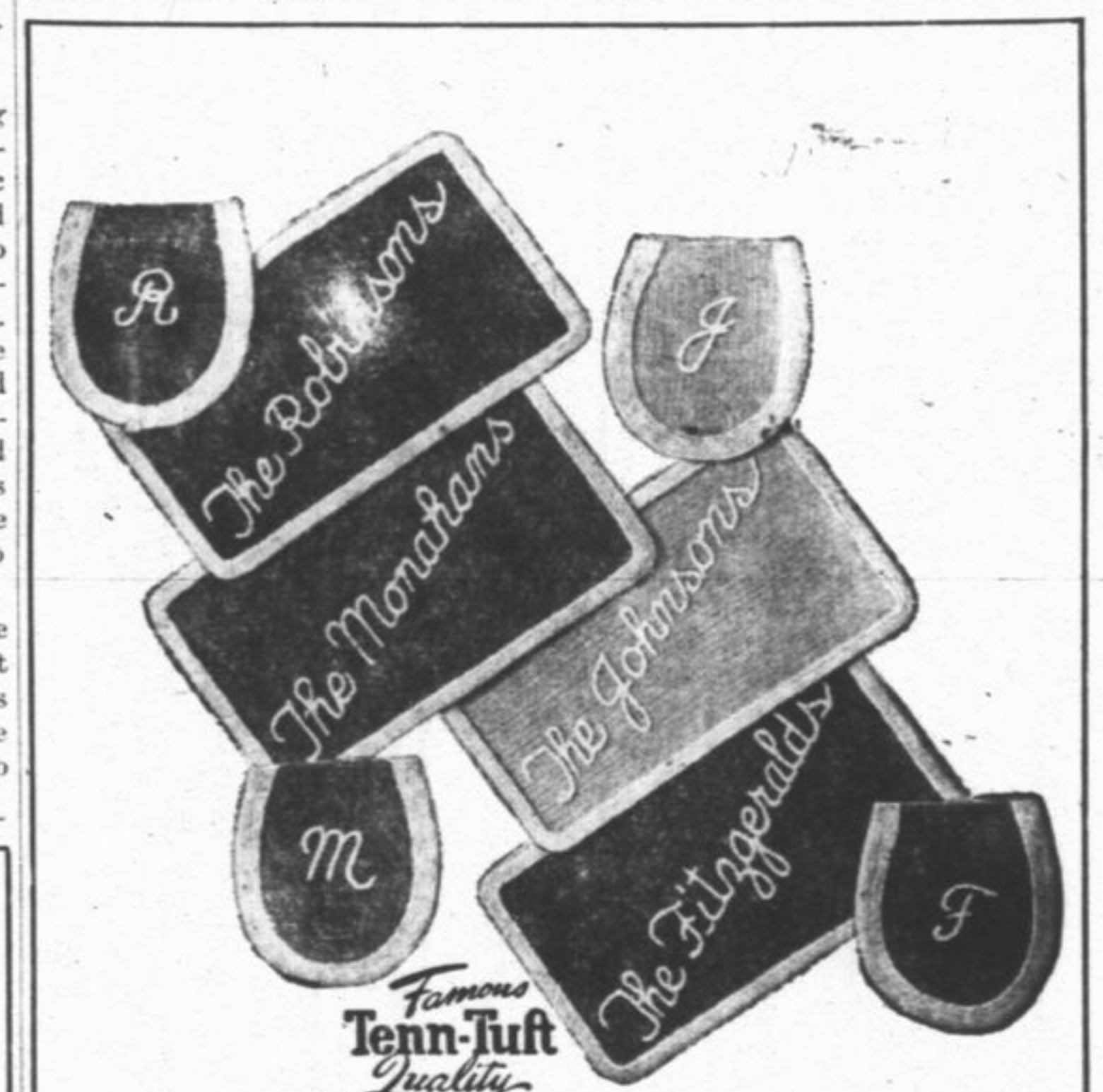
