2. On the second occasion a fire was reported at 647 Grandview Avenue. The party on the line was much excited, and the assistant fire chief could not understand whether the party said Grandview or Glenview. At last the party stated that the fire was near Berkeley Road. This clue sent the department to Grandview Avenue, the right place to go, but, in the meantime the Police Department was looking for a fire at Glenview Avenue. At this fire a small child was fatally burned and died at the hospital. This death was not due to any delay on the part of the department, however.

3. On the third occasion a fire was reported at 628 Glenview Avenue. The assistant chief asked what was burning, and the operator said she did not know as the party had hung up. Engines No. 3 and 4 proceeded to Glenview Avenue but found no such number and called the operator. She still said the call came from 628 Glenview Avenue. On further check up it was found that the fire was 628 Grandview Avenue. Fortunately, there was no damage. A damper had fallen in a fire place (continued on page 6)
