Our School Board has set the maximum pay for elementary The win at North Chicago, and teachers with a master's degree at has just changed the District 108 policy so that it now requires our teachers to put in 21 years of service before reaching the maximum pay instead of 15 years as

previously required. When the greater living costs in Highland Park are taken into consideration, it appears that we are offering teachers a definitely inferior salary schedule.

Instead of spending \$1,400,000 for a new elementary school, the need for which is doubtful, perhaps the use of a few thousands of dollars to raise this sub-standard salary scale would do more to improve our eucational system, and at a vast saving in taxes. The quality of education depends much more on obtaining good teachers than it does on the construction of fancy or superfluous

Open Letter

What is the REAL reason behind the monumental rise in school taxes of District 198?

It can't be the teacher-salary increases as the School Board charges in their report entitled "A Report From Your School Board" sent out in June. Their own facts belie these charges.

The report from the Board shows in Table I an item "Instruction-Salaries" to be \$39,960 more than the previous year. Compare this with the total increase of \$214,300! Quite a difference, isn't there?

Now, let's look at this \$39,960. First, 56 teachers are to raised about \$200 per year, \$11,200. Then, according to the report, two teachers are to be added-probably not at the maximum and let's hope not at the minimum of \$2200—iet's \$4000 (admittedly high). That's \$8000 more.

Certainly the phenomenal school tax rise can not be due to \$19,200 increase in teacher's salaries-or even the budgeted \$39 .-
