Highland Park Public Library Has Fine **Music Department**

The music department of the Highland Park Public Library has grown a great deal since its beginning eighteen years ago. In August, 1931, about sixty symphony scores were purchased to start a new department in the newly constructed building. Fifty chamber music scores were added to the collection in 1934, and since then the number of scores has grown to approximately one hundred-fifty.
