**LEGAL**

**AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE ALTERATION, REPAIR OR CHANGE OF USE, ALSO INCREASE IN HEIGHT OR AREA OF EXISTING BUILDINGS (REPEALING AND SUPERSEDING SECTIONS 9 AND 10 OF ARTICLE II OF CHAPTER 17 OF THE HIGHLAND PARK CITY CODE OF 1919, BEING SECTIONS 370 AND 371 THEREOF AS AMENDED)**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION I. That the provisions of Sections 9 and 10 of Article II of Chapter 17 of the Highland Park City Code, being Sections 370 and 371 of the Highland Park City Code, be and the same are hereby repealed, and the provisions as follow herein shall supersede and control in lieu thereof, that the provisions hereof shall be hereafter known and cited as Section 370 of the Highland Park City Code:

Section 370. The following provisions shall apply when any building is sought or required to be remodelled, altered, restored or repaired and said existing building does not conform to the requirements of this code for new buildings for the proposed use, or where by reason of change of use or occupancy an existing building does not conform to the requirements of this code for new buildings for the proposed use:

(a) Alterations and Repairs. If alterations, restoration or repair in excess of 33-1/3% of the reasonable fair market value of an existing building are desired to be or required to be made to such building within any period of two years, the entire building shall be made to conform with the requirements given herein for new buildings throughout. For the purposes of ascertainment of the fair cash market value at any time, the full assessed value of such improvement as assessed for general tax purposes shall be deemed prima facie to constitute the fair cash market value thereof.

(b) Changed Use or Occupancy. With the exception of Allocations, If the use of an existing building is changed to a use which would not be permitted in a similar building hereafter erected, the entire building shall be made to conform with the requirements given in this Code for new buildings of such class of use as they relate to loadings, sanitary facilities, fire resistance, and other provisions, provided that if the use of only a portion or portions of any existing building is changed and such portion or portions are separated from the remainder of the building by construction equal to the fire resistive value of the exterior walls, but in no instance less than one hour of fire resistance as to floors and ceilings measured by standards of the Building Code recommended by the National Board of Fire Underwriters as contained in Appendix "A," pages 164 to 167, inclusive, in the D. 1949 edition on file in the office of the Building Inspector of the City, which Appendix is hereby adopted as the standards of this City, and two hours fire resistance as to separating walls and partitions measured by the same standards, then only such portion or portions of the building so used need comply with the requirements of this Code relating to loadings, sanitary facilities and interior fire resistance provisions.

(c) Increases in Height. The number of stories in any existing building shall not be increased unless the building and all existing or proposed additions and alterations are made to comply with all the requirements of this Code for new buildings, for any proposed use.

(d) Increases in Area. No addition to the floor area of an existing building shall be made unless such proposed additions and alterations are made to comply with all the requirements of this Code for new buildings, and separating construction shall not be less than three hours fire resistance according to the standards above adopted.

(e) Exit Requirements. Where any change of use is sought or made in any existing building or any alteration of any building is sought or made, such building shall be made to comply with all of the provisions of this Code regulating exits.

(f) Structural Alterations and Repairs. Where any alteration, restoration or repair is made of the structural portion of any building, such structural portion thereof shall be made to conform to the requirements of the Code for new buildings.

(g) Non-structural Alterations and Repairs. Minor non-structural alterations and repairs, where no change of use is involved may be made with the same materials of which the building is constructed, except roof covering. Wherever any roof covering requires repairs, alterations involving more than 10% of the roof area, and the existing roof covering does not conform to the requirements of the district with respect to the Fire limits, the whole roof covering shall be renewed in accordance with this Code for new buildings. Where change of use is proposed or effected, the provisions of Sub-section (b) hereof shall control as to interior fire resistance and sanitary installations.

SECTION II. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, and expressly the provisions of Sections 370 and 371 of the Highland Park City Code heretofore existing, be and they are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION III. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, recordation and publication, as required by law.


**Timm**
