### CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION

On Thursday, October 20th at 8:00 P. M. in the Council Chamber, City Hall, the Civil Service Commission of the City of Highland Park will hold an examination to establish an eligible list for assistant building inspector. All applicants must have had some college training in Engineering, preferably a graduate of some school of recognized standing. Physical ability, previous experience, knowledge of building design and drafting with general administration will be considered. Starting salary will be \$3106 per year with a scale limit of \$3636 per year within the three year period. Application blanks may be obtained from the city clerk. The State Civil Service law requires a fee of three dollars to be paid by all applicants when filing application.

CLERK-STENOGRAPHER A second examination will be given to establish an eligible list for Clerk-Stenographer for the City Clerk. Applicants must be able to take dictation, transcribe, do typing and be able to do general office work. Starting salary \$2172 per year, with automatic raises. ## Increase of Fires In Schools, Churches, Hospitals

More schools, churches and hospitals are catching fire now than two years ago, says the National Fire Protective Association.

Latest NFPA records of fires during a one year period show a 9 per cent increase in the number of fires in schools, a 24 per cent increase for churches and a 20 per cent increase for hospitals and institutions. Other categories showing increases during the last two years are apartments and rooming houses, 14 per cent; manufacturing plants, 8 per cent; garages and filling stations, 6 per cent; hotels and boarding houses, 18 per cent; restaurants and taverns, 52 per cent, and theaters and other amusement places, 13 per cent.

"Human carelessness is the basic cause of nearly all fires," says Percy Bugbee, general manager of the NFPA. "We urge everyone to take advantage of Fire Prevention Week, October 9-15, to learn how to prevent fires and, equally important, to do what they learn."

tionally sound and would make possible additions and improvements in our upper grade school program. Space would be provided for Home Economics, and adequate gymnasium space would make it possible to improve the upper grade program without having to duplicate the offerings in each of the four schools.

A referendum was held in May, 1946, which authorized the Board to purchase a ten acre site for the new school. In June, 1948, a referendum was held which authorized the modernization of our four present schools, the building of an addition to West Ridge school and the construction of an intermediate school. Since that time, the Board has been working with the architect in development of complete drawings and specifications for the new school. The modernization and additions approved in the program have largely been completed.

The new school contemplated would be similar to those already in use in Evanston, Wilmette, Winnetka and Glencoe. The building would be designed to serve the educational needs of the boys and girls in the upper grades in one centrally located building. The four present schools would then serve more efficiently the needs of the children in grades Kindergarten through five.

## New Ravinia Postal Facilities

In answer to inquiries of Ravinia patrons, Postmaster Cobb of Highland Park states that not only will all of the present services at the Ravinia post office be continued after Nov. 1st at the same location: stamps, money orders, postal notes, registry, acceptance of parcel post, post office boxes for rent, savings bonds, etc., but that there will also be available the additional services offered by offices of the 1st class, making unnecessary any trip to the Highland Park office by mailers in the Ravinia and Braeside sections.

The Ravinia branch post office will open a half hour earlier than the present office; with an increase in the number of both incoming and outgoing mails, including a dispatch both Saturday and Sunday afternoon. Air-mail from there will be speeded up by connection with the helicopter landing three times daily in Highland Park. Mail for Ravinia patrons—addressed either Ravinia or Highland Park—will be routed thru the Ravinia office, avoiding present forwarding delays and postage due. A telephone will be installed for patron inquiries.

The four carrier routes to be worked from the Ravinia branch will serve the whole of the Ravinia section proper—both north and south of Roger Williams Ave. on both east and west sides. Carriers will be on the street delivering at 8:30 for the morning trip and at 1:30 for the afternoon trip. Delivery of parcel post to Ravinia business houses and residents will be correspondingly speeded up thru these changes.
