Any license granted under the provisions of this ordinance may be revoked by the mayor for any violation of Section 3 hereof, and such revocation shall be in addition to any fine imposed by virtue of this section SECTION 6. > This year saw the completion Williams Avenue, in time for use during the 1949 bathing season. It created much interest particularly the residents of the southern part of Highland Park. Many favorable comments were passed upon the building and the operation of the beach, with some criticism, but on the whole the entire beach operations were commented upon very favorably.

Since there are now two complete bath houses in operation it is impossible to compare this year's operation with that of previous years when only one bath house was in use,

A few statistics might be of after its passage, approval, records- interest at this point. It was found that more tokens were sold at Rosewood Beach than at Central Beach. On the other hand the daily fee sales was more at Central Beach than at Rosewood Beach. The refreshment sales at Rosewood Beach were somewhat higher than those at Central Beach. In the over all picture for the season the revenue received was higher at Central Beach than at Rosewood Beach.

Unfortunately there is no way to get a person by person count of those who use the beaches during the bathing season, but there were approximately 32,000 in attendance at both beaches.

From the time the beaches opened up the middle part of June to the first of August the attendance was extremely good. However the first of August saw a cool spell that made the water rather uncomfortable. Then a number of polio cases served to cut the attendance down to where very few were using the beaches. A third factor was the gasoline drivers Mrs. Andrew J. Taft strike that prevented the use of 2625 County Line Rd. cars for any great distance. So for the month of August and until the beaches closed Labor Day week end the attendance was
