The Highland Park Public Library is currently featuring an exhibit of old and valuable china belonging to Mr. Leon Harris, 2380 N. Deere Park Drive, and Mr. Robert G. Robinson, 150 S. 1st Street. They have chosen pottery and porcelain of Dutch, English, and Chinese origin from their collections for the exhibition. Many of the items date back to 1750 and beyond, and include Wedgwood and Leeds Creamware, Lustre Ware, Chelsea Plate, Staffordshire, Delft, and others. One section features commemorative blue china, interesting from an historical point of view as well as from a china collector's.
