## LEGAL

NOTICE OF SALE OF PUBLIC LANDS PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on Monday, the 24th day of October, A.D. 1949 an ordinance was unanimously adopted by the City Council of the City of Highland Park authorizing and directing the sale of the following described property, to-wit:

Parcel No. 1. Lots Nineteen (19), Twenty (20) and Twenty-one (21) in Block Seven (7), in Fire Station Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois; together with all of the right, title and interest of the City of Highland Park in any to an easement for ingress and egress over, along and upon the premises described as follows: Parcel No. 2. A tract or parcel of land lying or being in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, State of Illinois, more particularly described as follows: Beginning at the Northwest corner of Lot Fourteen (14), running thence in an Easterly direction One Hundred Fifty and Two One Hundredths (150.02) feet to the Northeast corner of Lot Fourteen (14), thence in a Southerly direction along the Easterly line of Lot Fourteen (14), Nine and Sixty-five One Hundredths (9.65) feet to the place of beginning, all in Block Seven (7), in West Division of Highland Park, in Section Twenty-three (23), Township Forty-three (43) North, Range Twelve (12) East of the Third Principal Meridian, in Lake County, Illinois.

Said Parcel No. 1 above described, is a parcel of land formerly used by the City as a City Hall and Fire Station site, and subsequent thereto has been used by the City of Highland Park under the jurisdiction of the Playground and Recreation Board for a Community Center. Title to said premises is vested in the City of Highland Park, a municipal corporation. Parcel No. 2 above described is an easement only and has been used for ingress and egress to and from Lot 21 aforesaid.

Said premises are offered for sale in separate parts or parcels, combination of parcels or as an entire tract to the highest and best bidder therefor or the best aggregate bidders therefor. Bids for the purchase of said property will be received and considered by the City Council at the regular meeting to be held at the City Hall in the City of Highland Park upon Monday, the 24th day of November, 1949 at 8:00 o'clock P.M., at which time the bid or bids will be opened and considered. All bids shall be made upon the following terms and conditions, which are the terms and conditions provided by the City Council for the sale of the property hereinabove described:

1. Possession shall be reserved until date of May 1, 1950 of the Community Center building located upon Lot 19, Block 7 aforesaid, without payments of rental.

2. The purchaser or purchasers shall take subject to exceptions or objections to title as follows as to Parcel No. 1 aforesaid:

(a) The usual and general exceptions or objections to title contained in letters of opinion on title or title-guarantee policies of Illinois Title Company, Waukegan, Illinois, but excluded from the foregoing is the easement for ingress and egress above described.

(b) Rights of the public, the municipality and the adjoining owners in and to that part of premises in question falling in roads, streets and highways, if any.

3. The successful bidder or bidders shall pay cash in the full amount of such bid or bids upon delivery of corporate deed of the City of Highland Park accompanied by letter of opinion on title of Illinois Title Company as to said Parcel No. 1 showing title free and clear except as aforesaid, and such bidder or bidders will be further furnished guarantee policy of Illinois Title Company in the amount of such bid or bids, but excluded from the foregoing is the easement for ingress and egress above described.

4. All bids shall be accompanied by a certified check in the amount of ten per cent (10%) of the amount of each bid.

5. In the event that the aggregate bids for parts or parcels or combination of parcels of said land shall exceed the highest bid for the tract as a whole, then such highest aggregate bidder or bidders shall be deemed to be the successful bidder or bidders.

6. All bids shall be sealed and deposited with the City Clerk for presentation to the City Council at said meeting. The City of Highland Park reserves the right by majority of the City Council to reject any and all bids and to adjourn consideration of any, and all bids to a subsequent regular meeting of said Council.

## "Death of a Salesman" At Erlanger Theatre

The rare combination of a great play and a superb performance is creating theatrical history in Chicago.

The play is "Death of a Salesman," by Arthur Miller, 1949 winner of the Pulitzer Prize, the Drama Critics Award and every other honor that can be bestowed upon a drama. The performance that has excited the interest of playgoers throughout the country is that of Thomas Mitchell in the role of Willy Loman, star-crossed salesman who is the central character of the play. Mitchell's enactment of the famous role stirs audiences to an ovation of unprecedented proportions each night at Chicago's Erlanger Theatre, where the play is being presented.

Word of the caliber of Mitchell's performance has spread throughout the country at a rapid rate, to judge from the mail orders being received by the theatre from cities as far distant as Seattle and Miami. Virtually everyone who is planning to visit or pass through Chicago seems anxious to see the noted actor in this, his most famous role.

Chicago's drama critics have been enthusiastic about both the play and its star. Claudia Cassidy of the Chicago Tribune hailed him as "a great actor." Ashton Stevens of the Herald-American acclaimed the play as a "whopping hit" and characterized Mitchell's interpretation as "a performance to remember him by." Robert Polak of the Sun-Times said the play was "the most exciting theatre in town" and called Mitchell's performance a "shattering, tearing interpretation of a gargantuan part." Sydney J. Harris of the News urged his readers not to miss the play and said the actor scored "an impressive success." William Leonard of the Journal of Commerce hailed the play as both "one of the theatre's great events" and "a stimulating theatrical treat" and credited Mitchell with a magnificent performance.
