

Cranberry Tarts



Cranberry jelly is the easy, flavorful filling of these double-deck pastry tarts.

Look to your cookie cutters and other gadgets to make novel tarts from tender pastry. A star cookie cutter and a small round cutter (from biscuit cutter) were all that was needed to shape the star-bright pastries pictured here.

Different fillings as well as different shapes may be used to vary an assortment of crisp tarts. Bright preserves and jellies, or mincemeat, are especially good.

Odd pieces of pastry will be left after cutting the tarts. Pile the pieces in layers, about three or four to a layer, as this seems to keep pastry very flaky when it is rolled a second time. Sprinkle rolled-out pastry with a cinnamon and sugar mixture, then cut into individual pie-shaped pieces or squares, and bake. Cranberry star pastries make attractive refreshments for the holiday whirl as well as dessert tidbits for the family.

CRANBERRY. TARTS 2 cups sifted enriched flour 3/3 cup shortening 1 teaspoon salt

Sift together flour and salt. Cut or rub in shortening. Add water. Mix to a dry crumbly dough. Toss on lightly floured pastry cloth. Press dough together. Roll out one-eighth inch thick. Cut with floured star-shaped cutter. Place half of stars on ungreased baking

3 to 3 tablespoons cold water 11/2 cups cranberry sauce sheet. Put about one tablespoon cranberry sauce on each star. Cut small holes in remaining stars. Place on top of other stars. Seal edge together. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 12 to 15 minutes.)

Makes about 18 tarts.
