LEGAL

AN ORDINANCE FIXING A SCHEDULE OF FEES FOR BUILDING PERMITS (AMENDING SECTION 20 OF ARTICLE III OF CHAPTER XVII, PARAGRAPH 401 OF THE HIGHLAND PARK CITY CODE)

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION I. That Section 20 of Article III of Chapter XVII, Paragraph 401 of the Highland Park City Code, be and the same is hereby amended and so amended shall read as follows: 401. Amount of Permit Fees. 20. Every person, firm or corporation who shall apply for and receive a permit as herein provided shall pay to the City Collector concurrently with the issuance of such permit an amount computed as follows:

(a) The fee to be charged for a permit to construct, erect, enlarge, remodel, alter or repair any wall, structure, building or part thereof shall be one dollar (\$1.00) plus one-third of one per cent of the first \$250,000.00 of the estimated total cost of the material and labor required for the proposed work plus one-sixth of one per cent of the remainder of that estimated total cost. Such estimated cost shall be determined by the building inspector as follows: The building inspector may accept an estimate furnished him by the applicant for the permit, or he may require a certificate from a licensed architect or an affidavit from the owner or his agent as to the total cost of the proposed work. In the absence of such information he may make such estimate as building inspector.

(b) The fee to be charged for permits to move, raise, lower, underpin or widen any building or structure, respectively, shall be as follows:
 (1) For moving over, upon or in any public highway buildings or structures, one and one-half stories or less in height \$50.00
 (2) For moving over, upon or in any public highway buildings or structures of more than one and one-half stories in height \$75.00
 (3) For moving buildings or structures within the limits of any one block when the same does not pass over, upon or in any public highway \$25.00
 (4) For moving buildings or structures within the limit of any lot where the same does not pass over, upon or in any public highway \$10.00

(5) For raising, lowering or underpinning any building \$10.00
 (6) The fee to be charged for permits to wreck a building or structure shall be one dollar (\$1.00) plus five cents per 1,000 feet of cubical content of the building or structure.
 (c) The permit fees required in subsections (a) and (b) hereinabove shall be exclusive of the charges and rates for the supply and use of water to any premises to be improved. When any applicant shall require water at any premises to be improved, the same shall be furnished at the water rates now in force or as the same may be hereafter fixed.

SECTION II. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed. The provisions of Section 20, Article III, Chapter XVII, Paragraph 401 are expressly superseded by the provisions hereof.

SECTION III. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and recordation, as required by law.
