The American Legion hopes to make "Tot" a "tremendously effective agent of international good will".

The American Legion urges the children of America to speak to them through "Tot"—to give them the assurance of a child's toy and a child's word that the spirit of peace and fellowship introduced by another child two thousand years ago still lives."

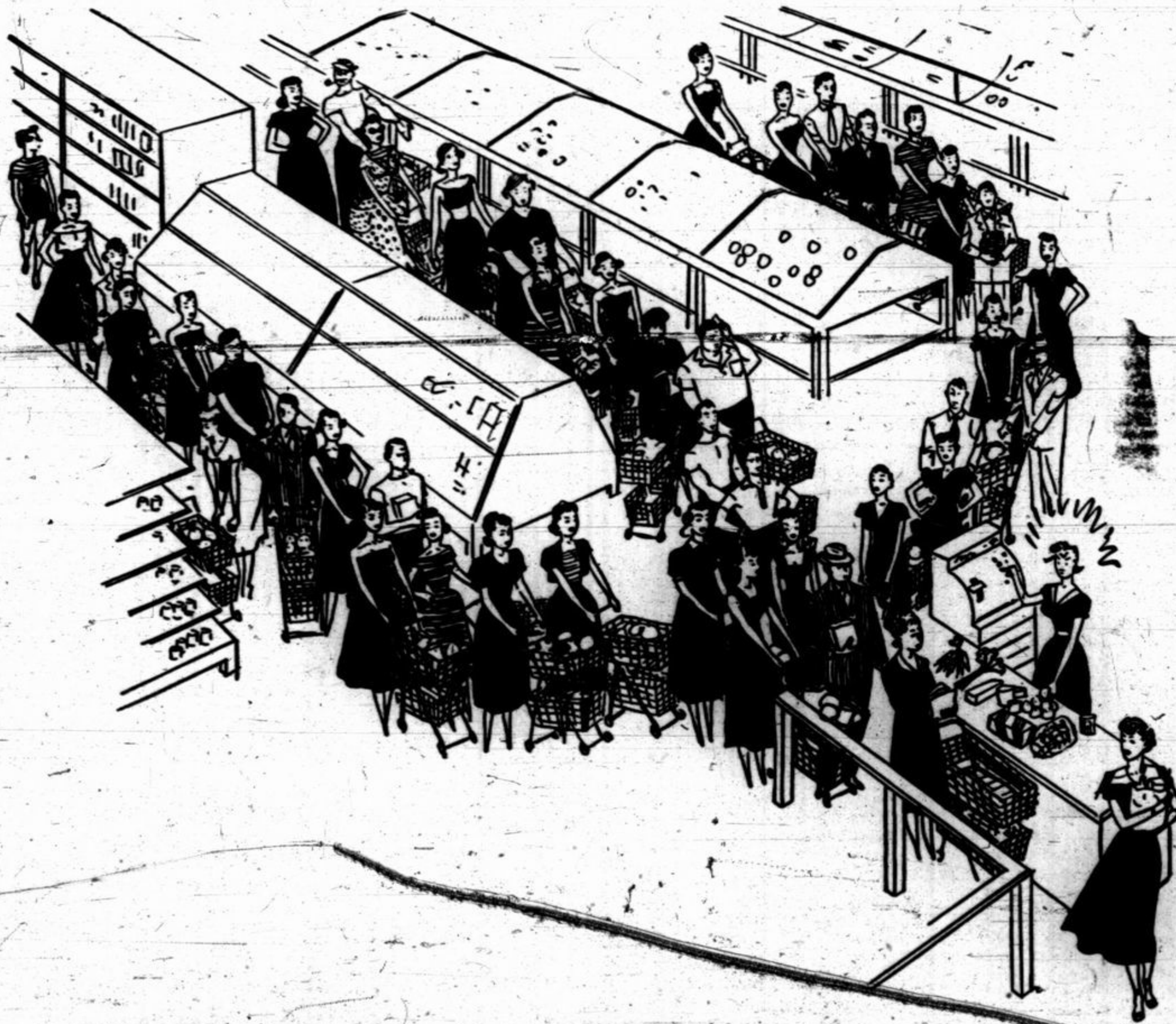
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
