No date has been set for the wedding.

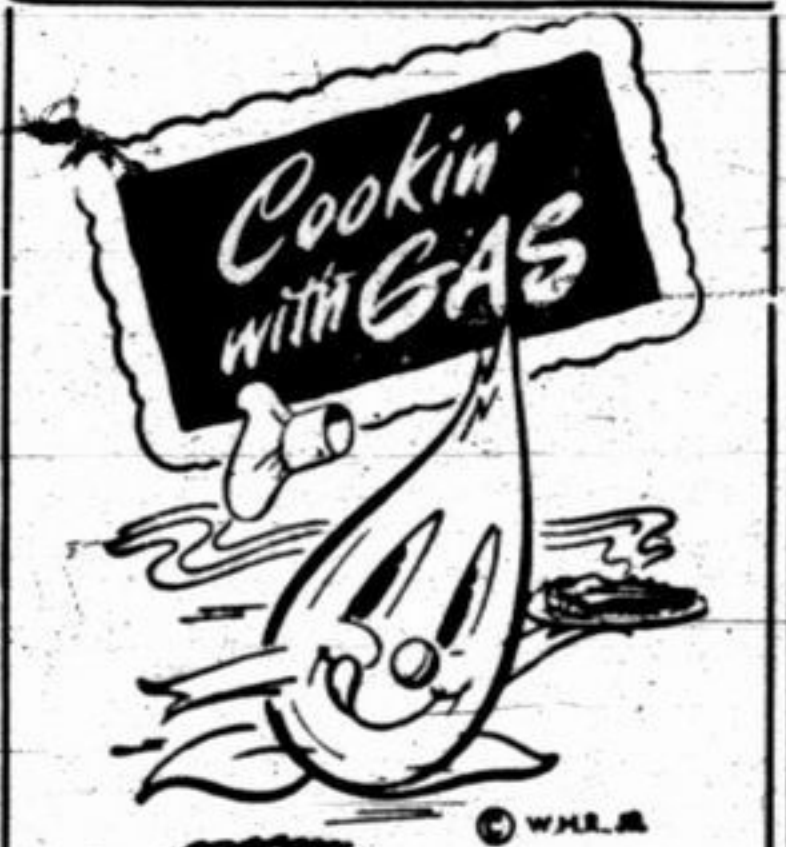
RETURN HOME
