1. Why are these boys losing ball games in the last half?
2. Why are so many of our boys fouling out of the game?
3. Why can't our boys keep up with their opponents?
4. Why are some of these same boys being tardy in getting to school in the morning?
5. Why are we having trouble with blue cards on our ball team?
6. Why do our boys grab a hamburger or a hot dog instead of an appropriate meal before a contest?
7. Why do our boys pick the night before a contest to attend house parties?

These are just a few questions that could be asked in connection with the Highland Park high school frosh-soph basketball team.

Is the coach expected to play the roll of a policeman? To see that these boys get in at night in order to keep them in condition to play a full game? The writer believes it is neither the desire nor the duty of the coach to assume such responsibilities.

Now what can be done about this existing situation? If these boys are in the proper condition, in which sleep plays an all important part, then they will be physically able to stand the last half of a ball game as they did the first half. The fouls they are committing will be decreased by the fact that a boy is able to keep pace with his opponent instead of taking the path of least resistance which means fouling or letting his opponent score. We are quite sure that our boys could keep pace with their opponents if they were in the proper condition, since, from all observation made, the teams they are playing are made up of human beings and there seems to be nothing super human about them with the exception of being in good physical condition.

Boys, since there seem to be no cases of sleeping sickness on the squad don't you think that you could arrange to have your dates so that you are off the streets at night and get enough sleep to enable you to get up in time to get to school by 8:30 a.m. (not p.m.), huh?

Instead of using your head to devise ways of breaking training rules, stay at home and apply as much thinking on your studies and the blue card situation will be whipped.

Moms and Dads, since there are no training table facilities furnished by the school, help us to see that your son gets the kind of a meal needed before a contest. We are sure that you will cooperate when you stop to realize just how important this aspect is in the health and well being of your son and also the benefit he will derive by being able to play a better ball game and win, rather than lose all the time. You can also help do the school and the coaches a big favor by seeing that your son is absent from all parties on week day nights.

We wonder if you, as players parents and fans and student body of Highland Park high school want a winning basketball team,

as well as other good teams to represent your school. A little help from you will be greatly appreciated by all those concerned with the coaching of your boys in all sports at the high school. We are sure that in the end you will be proud to be able to say that you did your part in helping to bring Highland Park high school out of the athletic "dumps."

**FOR GIRLS ONLY**—Since this cooperation means so much would it be asking too much of the girls to help arrange their dates so that these boys can get home before 9:30 on week nights? Have dates on Saturday and Sunday nights. If you are really interested in the basketball team and your school along with the welfare of your boy friend, please give him a break by seeing that they keep training rules.

After the first week of rigid training rules the frosh-soph team really laid the wood to Leyden, a team which had beaten them a few weeks before and the consensus of opinion of the boys still on the team was that training was all right after all. So come on folks let's really get behind Mr. Morrison in this drive to bring Highland Park frosh-soph teams into the win column where they belong.

Then on Saturday evening the boys really looked good as they defeated Grayslake by a 49 to 25 score with every boy on the bench getting an opportunity to get into the ball game. Boys, you can be a fine ball team if you, with the help of your folks and fellow students, will continue to adhere to the wishes of Coach Morrison as to training rules.

The following night the Little Giants traveled to Grayslake, and there put up a great battle before being nipped in a thriller 43 to 40. The Little Giants led all the way until the last minute of the first half, when Grayslake's

Stickles and Peterson teamed up to pour in a pair of buckets and a 21 to 19 lead at intermission.

In the third period Grayslake widened their lead 34 to 26. It looked like a walk-away, but in the final frame the Little Giants caught fire and started to rally. In fact, twice in the last five minutes they were within two points of tying up the game—only to have Grayslake tally and hold their lead till the clock ran out.

This Friday the Little Giants will travel to Waukegan to take on the scrappy Bulldogs. The first game will be called at 7:15. For those unable to get to the game, the varsity contest will be broadcast over WKRS-FM, 106.7 on your dial. The game will begin about 8:30.
