Mrs. Donald Boynton Entertains Music Club In Religious Program

Two talented members of the Music Club gave an outstanding program at its January meeting at the home of Mrs. Donald Boynton, 608 Hawthorne Lane. In keeping with the spiritual character of the program, Mrs. Lester Laubenstein and her able accompanist rendered a number of moving religious songs. Following the singing the hostess, Mrs. Boynton, gave an inspiring talk on the conception and building of a small Norwegian Chapel on the Boynton summer estate at Bailey's Harbor, Wisconsin, on the shore of Lake Michigan.

All buildings and entrance gate are constructed in pure peasant Norwegian architecture, with its beautiful wood carving and decorated walls and ceilings. The Chapel, too, is of pure Norwegian architecture, with slender gables pointing heavenward.

The building of this Chapel was a labor of love for Mr. and Mrs. Boynton, requiring thousands of hours of intensive research, thousands of hours of wood carving and fresco painting; but most of all, deep inspiration, human understanding and faith in God. Herself a sculptress of great talent and a painter of remarkable skill and sensitivity of color, Mrs. Boynton has painted murals in this little Chapel which recall the beauty and simplicity of the Giotto frescoes in Assisi. With her deep understanding of religious beliefs, Mrs. Boynton expressed her faith in Christianity as the religious basis of universal peace and the brotherhood of man.

Her talk, colorfully illustrated with slides of pictures of the country home and inspirational Chapel, was a sermon which stirred and exalted its listeners. It is to be hoped that Mr. and Mrs. Boynton—for Mr. Boynton shares in the presentation—will give this illustrated talk, entitled "And so a Chapel was Built" many more times in Highland Park.
