NOTICE OF SALE OF PUBLIC LANDS

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on Tuesday, the 27th day of December, A. D. 1949 an ordinance was unanimously adopted by the City Council of the City of Highland Park authorizing and directing the sale of the following described property, to-wit:

Lot Nineteen (19), Twenty (20) and Twenty-one (21) in Block Seven (7), in the City of Highland Park, together with all of the right, title and interest of the City of Highland Park in and to an easement for ingress and egress over, along and upon the premises described as follows:

A tract or parcel of land lying or being in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, State of Illinois, more particularly described as follows: Beginning at the Northwest corner of Lot Fourteen (14), running thence in an Easterly direction One Hundred Fifty and Two One Hundredths (150.02) feet to the North-east corner of Lot Fourteen (14), thence in a Southerly direction along the Easterly line of Lot Fourteen (14), Nine and Sixty-five One Hundredths (9.65) feet, thence in a Westerly direction parallel with the North line of Lot Fourteen (14), One Hundred Fifty and Two One Hundredths (150.02) feet to the Westerly line of Lot Fourteen (14), thence in a Northerly direction Nine and Sixty-five One Hundredths (9.65) feet to the place of beginning in Block Seven (7), in West Division of Highland Park, in Section Twenty-three (23), Township Forty-three (43) North, Range Twelve (12), East of the Third Principal Meridian, in Lake County, Illinois.

Lot Nineteen (19) (except the West Three and Eighty-two One Hundredths (3.82) feet thereof) above described, is a parcel of land owned by the City of Highland Park, Illinois, and is under the jurisdiction of the Playground and Recreation Board for a Community Center. Lot Twenty (20) and the West Three and Eighty-two One Hundredths (3.82) feet thereof, is a parcel of land owned by the City of Highland Park, Illinois, and is used by it under the jurisdiction of the Playground and Recreation Board in connection with the Community Center. Lot Twenty-one (21), above described, was previously used by the United States of America as a U.S.O. Center. The remainder of the property above described is an easement only and has been used for ingress and egress from Lot Twenty-one (21) aforesaid. Title to Lots Nineteen (19), Twenty (20) and Twenty-one (21) in Block Seven (7) aforesaid is vested in the City of Highland Park, a municipal corporation.

Said premises are offered for sale in separate parts or parcels, combination or combinations of parcels or as an entire tract to the highest and best bidder therefor or the best aggregate bidder therefor. Bids for the purchase of said property will be received and considered by the City Council at the regular meeting to be held at the City Hall in the City of Highland Park on Monday, the 27th day of February, 1950 at 8:00 o'clock P. M., at which time the bid or bids will be opened and considered. All bids shall be made upon the following terms and conditions, which are the terms and conditions provided by the City Council for the sale of the property hereinabove described:

(1) Sealed bids will be received for said property or any part or parcel, combination or combinations of parcels thereof or as an entire tract. Such bidder or bidders shall accompany such sealed bids by certified check in the amount of ten per cent (10%) of the amount of bid. Such tender shall be

considered earnest money in the event that such bidder or bidders shall be declared to be the successful bidder or bidders and be subject to and be forfeited in the event of failure by any declared successful bidder to consummate purchase by his act or omission. In the event that the aggregate bids for parts or parcels or combination of parcels shall exceed the highest bid for the tract as a whole, then such highest aggregate bidder or bidders shall be deemed to be the highest bidder for the entire tract.

(2) Possession shall be reserved until date of May 1, 1950 of the Community Center building located upon Lot 19, Block 7 aforesaid, without payment of rental.

(3) The City further reserves from such sale all furniture, recreational fixtures, refrigerator, gas range and kitchen equipment contained on the premises.

(4) The purchaser or purchasers shall take Lots 19, 20 and 21 in Block 7 aforesaid, subject to exception or objections to title as follows:

(a) The usual and general exceptions or objections to title contained in letters of opinion on title or title guarantee policies of Illinois Title Company, Waukegan, Illinois.

(b) Rights of the public, the municipality and the adjoining owners in and to that part of premises in question falling in roads, streets and highways, if any.

(5) The successful bidder or bidders shall pay cash in the full amount of such bid or bids upon delivery of corporate deed of the City of Highland Park accompanied by letter of opinion on title of Illinois Title Company covering only Lots 19, 20 and 21 in Block 7 above described, showing title free and clear except as aforesaid, and also such exceptions or objections to title as will be obviated and waived upon delivery and recording of the City's deed of conveyance, and such bidder or bidders will be further furnished guarantee policy or policies of Illinois Title Company as to Lots 19, 20 and 21 in Block 7 aforesaid, in the amount of such bid or bids. No title policy, warranty or guaranty of the title will be provided as to the easement above described.

(6) All bids shall be accompanied by a certified check in the amount of ten per cent (10%) of the amount of each bid.

(7) In the event that the aggregate bids for parts or parcels or combination of parcels of said land shall exceed the highest bid for the tract as a whole, then such highest aggregate bidder or bidders shall be deemed to be the highest bidder or bidders for the entire tract. Said City may and hereby reserves the right to accept the highest bid for any parcel or parcels or combinations thereof and to reject any and all bids for the remainder.

(8) All bids shall be sealed and deposited with the City Clerk for presentation to the City Council at said meeting. The City of Highland Park reserves the right by majority of the City Council to reject any and all bids and to adjourn consideration of any and all bids to a subsequent regular meeting of said Council.

Said ordinance so passed on the 27th day of December, 1949 is on file in the office of the City Clerk in the City Hall at Highland Park, Illinois and is open to public inspection.

Now, after three weeks of training, which includes early bed time hours we find the lads playing a better brand of ball.

Last week end the "small-fry" won a sweet victory over Proviso by at 49 to 35 score with Big Bob George hitting the nets for 22 points.

On Saturday they just squeaked by New Trier by a 37-36 count after being behind all the way until the last few minutes of play.

We wish to congratulate the boys for the cooperation they have shown in Mr. Morrison's "all-out" training program and feel certain that Highland Park high school will, in the next couple of years, have a team that will bring them out of the cellar spot in the Suburban league.

The New Trier frosh-soph contest was a real thriller as the Green Wave took a 13-8 lead at the end of the first quarter and held a 21-14 advantage at half time. Highland Park came up to lag 31-29 as the fourth quarter started. The lead changed hands a couple of times and with two minutes to go the score was 36-35 in favor to New Trier. Then Renzo Marchietti hit for two big points to put the Little Giants in front by a 37-36 score. With Frank Picchiotti controlling the ball for most of the time the lads kept possession until the gun went off to end the game. The play of Freberg, Guentz (who also made a timely basket), Capitani, George and Pizzato also contributed to the winning cause for the new frosh-soph quintet.

The varsity had another bad week end and Bill Kiddle's story on that will be found elsewhere in this paper.

The varsity swimmers will be pointing, now, for the Suburban league meet which is to be held on February 11th with the State meet on February 24th and 25th.

The local high school cagers will tackle Oak Park at home on Friday and travel to Morton on Saturday. The frosh-soph will be out to avenge a 4 point defeat suffered earlier in the season at the hands of Oak Park.

As the 1949-50 basketball season starts down the home stretch we look back to the opening game for the varsity and see what their opponents are doing today. Argo, the Little Giant's first visitors, is setting a blistering pace in state-wide circles. The local boys went down to a 41-35 defeat to this team that won 13 straight before being defeated. They lost two games a couple of weeks ago but their 6 foot 6 inch center Harold Grant was out of action and with him back again things look much brighter now for the Argonites. They bounced back last Saturday into the win column for a season record of 14 wins and 2 defeats.

Boy Scouts Of America Observe 40th Anniversary

February 6th to 12th the Boy Scouts of America are observing their fortieth anniversary. Since its inception in 1910 more than sixteen and a half million boys have been affiliated with the movement. Today the Boy Scouts organization has an active enrollment of two and one half million boys and leaders.

The Boy Scouts of America is organized in all sections in the United States and in Alaska, Hawaii, canal Zone, Puerto Rico, Guam and the Virgin Islands and in many United States Army posts overseas.

Scouting Units in the North Shore Area Council number ninety with a total membership of four thousand boys and leaders. On Scout Sunday, February 12th, Cubs and Scouts will attend their respective services in uniform with their leaders. The Jewish faith will celebrate their services on Friday evening as Boy Scout Sabbath. Local Troops and Packs will put on public displays in store windows, hold parent open house meetings and Court of Honor banquets. Many communities will also hold Rallies and other public functions. The large number of Scout and Cub Leaders in our Council are the key volunteers in the movement. Special recognition is given to Leaders of this community who give unstintingly of their time and effort to make this program possible.
