A complete survey of the buildings has been made by our Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, Mr Earling Zaeske, and by our Principal, Mr. A. E. Wolto you the gist of their report to the Board and steps that have been or will be taken to remedy the situation.

This summer we rebuilt the stoker in the big boiler, which was installed in 1928. Besides this boiler, we have a hand-fired one, as stand-by equipment. It is not adequate to keep the buildings above a freezing temperature, should the big boiler go out a any time. If and when a new building should be added to the plant, we will need a new boiler plus a stoker under the hand-fired boiler. When we have converted all of our power to alternating current, we can go to low pressure boilers. This would be an economical change as then the heating plant would require the services of only one man for its operation. The services of an assistant engineer and two firemen, required now, would be eliminated.

The bus garage is new. It is adequate for our present transportation equipment. Should the North Shore Railroad be discontinued and more students be added to our present transportation load,
