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"House of God" At Mooseheart Child City Nearing Completion

The National Conference of Christians and Jews has selected, as worthy of editorial consideration in connection with the observance nationally of Brotherhood-Week (February 19-26), the nonsectarian church, called the House of God, that is being erected at Mooseheart, Ill. Mooseheart is the famed "Child City" near Chicago maintained by the Loyal Order of Moose for sons and daughters of deceased members.

The House of God, now nearing completion, is a \$1,500,000 edifice devoted to the spiritual and moral needs of the nearly 1,000 children of some 25 religious denominations represented at Mooseheart. Designed for beauty and permanence, the church is to have especially styled stained glass windows; an imposing 110-foot "tower of tolerance" housing a 64-bell tubular carillon, the largest of its kind in operation in the United States; and other features making it a center of worship in the bustling industrial and farming Fox River valley section in which Mooseheart is located.

Mooseheart, established by the fraternal order in 1913 to provide a primary and high school education and training in a vocational trade for its children, recognizes the importance of religion for the boys and girls of varied faiths living and growing up together. With that in mind, each child is reared in the beliefs which prevailed in his family home.

Ft. Sheridan Exceeds Polio Drive Goal

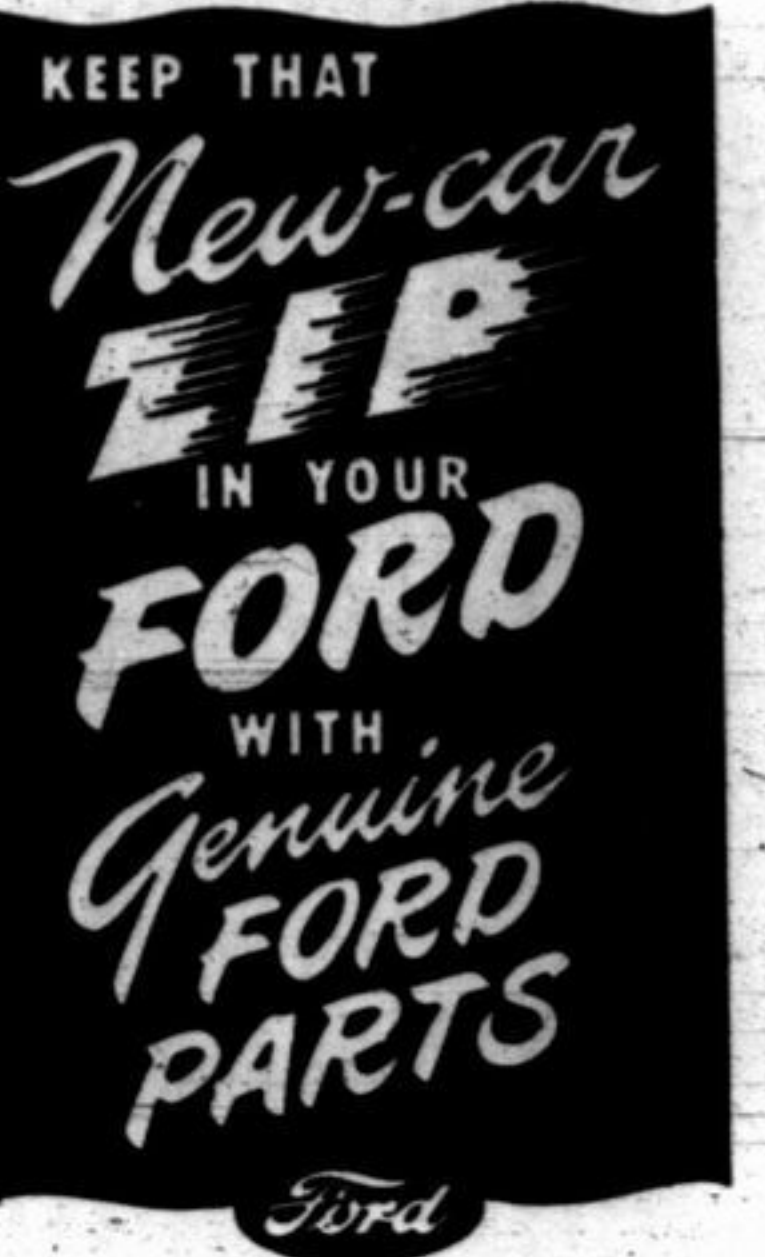

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One Month Remains To Register For April 11 Primary

Final date for voters to register for the April 11 primary is Mar. 13.

Anyone who has lived in the state for six months, in the county for 90 days, and in the precinct for 30 days is eligible to vote if he meets the age and citizenship requirements, County Clerk Morse said.

A registration change must be made if a voter has changed his address since his original registration, or, in the case of a woman, if she has married since her original registration.

Residents of the county are eligible to register if they will have met the residence requirements on or before April 11.

The permanent registration office is open daily in the courthouse.
