## Beauty Consultant Will Put Magic Into Woman's Club Address

Celeste Carlyle, nationally known style and beauty consultant, will address the Highland Park Woman's Club next Tuesday, February 21, on the subject "Decorate Yourself".

Mrs. Sidney Frisch, president, will call the meeting to order at 2 P.M. After a short business meeting the program chairman, Mrs. Garfield Day, will introduce the speaker of the afternoon.

Miss Carlyle began her career as a sketcher of imports for a fashionable women's wear firm in Chicago. Her observations that most women did not know how to clothe and groom themselves to their own best advantage, led directly to her consultation work. Realizing that there were no places where women could learn the principles which correlate hair styles, makeup and clothes, nor places where women could learn how to wear a costume with distinction and poise, she decided to do something about it. She went to Europe for research and study. She consulted designers and artists everywhere who could help in furthering her conviction that the right clothing and proper bearing could make any woman beautiful. After twelve years of supplementing her art training with study of beauty culture, chemistry, eurythmics and speech she opened her first studio in Chicago.

For the past seven years she has devoted most of her time to private consultation work. In her daily interviews she can give counsel to a limited few. So to bring her organized principles and easy methods to larger groups she now devotes considerable time to travelling and lecturing.

Miss Carlyle's academic training was received at the following schools: The Chicago Art Institute, The Chicago Academy of Fine Arts, Parker School of Beauty Culture, The Vogue School of Dress Design, Day Schools of Paris and The American Academy of Rome.

Celeste Carlyle knows the magic words to put heart into any woman's beauty program and to start her on the way to success. She has been called a "Morale-Booster" Extraordinary.

## Dr. Robert Lundin Member of Hamilton College Faculty

Dr. Robert W. Lundin, son of the A. Lundins of 937 Lincoln avenue, recently joined the faculty of Hamilton college, Clinton, New York, as an assistant professor of psychology. Previous to that time he held a similar position at Denison college, Granville, Ohio.

A graduate of University of Indiana, he also studied at University of Mexico and Northwestern university. He took both master's and doctor's degrees in psychology with his dissertation on "The Construction and Validation of a Test of Musical Knowledge, which will appear in the spring as an American Psychological monograph. Dr. Lundin is also completing a book on the psychology of music.

The rest of the program will be given by a former Highland Park, Grace Pfanstiel Eno and her husband, Arpad Eno, Jr. and accompanist, Sara Flanders. Mrs. Eno began the study of the violin in the fourth grade, with Mrs. Mannings as her teacher, and attended International National Music Camp for two summers. At the Salem Academy, however, in Winston-Salem, she changed to the study of the viola, and will give her concert on that instrument. At the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, N. Y. she was awarded the George Eastman Honorary Scholarship Plaque for a straight "A" record. Since that time she has played in the University of Chicago Orchestra, and in the Chicago Civic Orchestra, studying with Milton Preves of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. Her husband is a composer and clarinetist, although an analytical chemist by profession. Her accompanist is a member of several music ensemble groups.

The instrumental program is as follows: Slow Movement from the Handel Concerto for viola; 3 Movements from Suite No. 1 of Bach, without accompaniment; Brahms E Flat Clarinet Sonata Opus 120, No. 1. The program will be followed, as usual, by a tea served by the Chairman of the Hospitality Committee, Mrs. Lisle Hawley, and her assistants.
