Another basketball season has come and gone for the local high school with rather disastrous results for the varsity squad which won only one game out of 18 played.

The "small fry" wound up the season with a 9 won 9 loss record after dropping 5 of its first 7 contests.

Highland Park's Little Giants closed the book on the regular '49 - '50 Suburban league season last Friday night by going down in defeat for the 12th straight time.

The Little Giants went into this last contest minus the services of Coach Carlson, who was home ill. In his absence, the team was handled by Dorman Morrison, frosh-soph coach.

The Blue and White opened fast by matching Evanston point for point and held the Wildkats to a 13 to 12 edge in the first quarter.

Church World Service Program Sat., Mar. 4, Over WMAQ, 3:00 to 3:30

Local citizens are being asked to watch for the announcement of the hours in the first part of March when major radio stations and television programs will broadcast special features looking forward toward the "One Great Hour of Sharing" which is to take place in the churches of the United States on the morning of Sunday, March 12. One such broadcast will be heard over Station WMAQ on Saturday, March 4 from 3:00 to 3:30 p.m. when a dramatic account of the immigration and resettlement of up-rooted peoples all over the world will be presented.

These broadcasts are being sponsored by the Protestant Churches through the interdenominational organization known as "Church World Service." The "One Great Hour of Sharing" project is to encourage people to attend the churches of their choice on Sunday morning, March 12, and there present an offering for "The Needs of the World." The Christian denominations are anxious to continue their relief work to refugees around the world, and this is a united effort to promote such a benevolent work. "Local congregations are making arrangements for the reception of this offering which is to flow through denominational channels," reports Rev. Lester H. Laubenstein, President of the local Ministerial Association.
