

When the eleven o'clock hour "North Shore citizens want the comes next Sunday morning the of eleven. This hour will bring to a climax in over 100,000 churches of the United States the campaign to acquaint members and friends of these congregations with the desperate needs of people in Europe and Asia.

For weeks the "One Great Hour of Sharing" has been supported by radio transcriptions and network programs, by extensive newspaper promotion, by television and film strips, and by special literature. Christians cannot let children die because of lack of food, and let refugees go shelterless because no homes are provided. Yes, a new relief problem confronts them in 1950-at least it is new to most Americans. It is the refugee problem-with 12,000,000 refugees in Germany, 450,000 in Greece, 700,exam. Robert F. Walker, Jr., High- 000 in the Palestine areas, and some 5,000,000 in Korea. There are millions more in China. Here is a new challenge which Christians must help meet.

In a recent meeting of the Ministers of Highland Park and Highwood with Rev. Lester H. Laubenstein presiding, and Rev. Albert G. Masser as secretary, the Association voted to cooperate in the observance of this momentous hour of "Sharing." 
