Trip To Honolulu

Recently I met an interesting woman who teaches in Honolulu. She was leaving that day at 7:30 p.m., by Clipper, to reach Honolulu the next morning. It reminded me of the time my husband and I went there, shortly after the close of World War I, on an ocean liner, captured from the Germans and rechristened "City of Los Angeles." It was a huge boat with costly decorations.

We were to reach our destination in five days, but as it happened, it took seven. We left the west coast at noon, hand playing, confetti flying. Passengers on board would hold one end of a bolt of ribbon confetti and throw it to someone on the deck, who would hold it till the moving boat broke the ribbon. A pretty sight to put in memory's strong box.

On board was an entire Carnival outfit engaged by the Elks' club of Honolulu for a week's performance. They had the front end of the lower deck—six beautiful horses, a lion in a cage, a dozen monkeys, some trick dogs, a billy goat and trainers, acrobats and care-takers.

As soon as we got outside the keys we began to feel a storm in the air. We thought we knew all about storms from our experiences on Lake Michigan, but we had much to learn when it came to the Pacific Ocean kicking up its heels. Luckily we were good sailors.

During the storm it was necessary to build a roof over the horses because the waves swept over them. All the animals were laid low by that nasty Pacific Ocean—to say nothing of the people with them. Out of several hundred passengers, at times there were only twenty able to come to meals from Saturday to Thursday. After that time one could put his foot out to the same level on which he was standing instead of putting it down to find the floor. We went over 300 miles out of our way to give relief to the animals.

A band greeted us in Honolulu, and there was much diving for coins by the Hawaiian youngsters. Great sport.

We visited Hale, on the island of Hawaii, thirty miles from a volcano, which we visited. It was disconcerting to be told by a

lecturer, that evening, that we were sitting over a mass of boiling lava, even though the volcano was inactive at that time. Then to find, that night, at Volcano House, the mirror nailed securely to the wall in our bedroom, a hole cut in the table for the wash bowl and the bed fastened to the floor. Before we were ready to retire we were serenaded by the native drivers who brought us there.

But—one never knows. In the morning when we presented ourselves for breakfast at 8:30 we found the diningroom door locked and no one in sight. My husband always wanted to know WHY, so he went quietly around to the back and came back with this report:

"There was an eruption last night and it knocked down the kitchen chimney. The masons are rebuilding it and we will be served breakfast in about an hour."

The Pacific was like a mirror all the way back to California. On the way we saw a school of large fish, a battle between a whale and a shark, and a tortoise carrying a long-legged bird on his back.

Next time I go to Honolulu I shall go by boat and return by Clipper.
