Born in Waterloo, Wisconsin, 53 years ago, he had lived in Highland Park for 13 years. He was a member of Exmoor Country club, of the Masonic Lodge, of the Board of Directors of the Presbyterian church and an executive of the Land Products of Carbide and Carbon Company.

Besides his wife he is survived by a son, Charles, and a daughter, Charlotte, and by his parents, who live at Waterloo, Wisconsin, where interment was made after Masonic graveside services.

In Memoriam

The Highland Park Community, children and faculty are shocked at the death of two of our excellent young men; John Holmes, teacher at Braeside School and John Wagner, teacher at the West Ridge School. Although these men have been part of our faculty for only a short time, both had made lasting places for themselves among us. Both exemplified the character, scholarship and love of children so essential to good teaching.

John William Holmes was born in Baraboo, Wisconsin in 1920. He attended the high school at Baraboo and received his B. A. degree at the University of Wisconsin in 1940 and his Master's degree at the University of Chicago in 1948. Mr. Holmes taught at the high school in Palatine Illinois for one year before coming to Highland Park. He served in the U. S. Army Air Forces in Meteorology from September, 1941 until October, 1945. His quiet scholarly manner, love of teaching and conscientiousness had endeared him to his fellow teachers and to the students at Braeside School. Mr. Holmes is survived by his wife Margaret Walker Holmes and son Stephen Walker Holmes. Mrs. Holmes is expecting a second child shortly.

Mr. John Jerome Wagner was born in Jefferson, Wisconsin in 1923. He attended the Jefferson high school and received his B. E. degree from Whitewater Teachers College in 1948. Mr. Wagner taught high school in Bessmer, Michigan one year before coming to Highland Park. He served in the Armed Forces for three years—thirty months in foreign service, eleven months in combat. He held twelve U. S. military decorations and one foreign decoration. Mr. Wagner was an unusual person. His talent with youngsters was outstanding. His quiet sense of humor and his love of his profession were qualities for success in teaching. Mr. Wagner is survived by his wife Margaret Wagner and daughter Charlene.

The loss to our schools through the death of our two colleagues is great; our loss as a faculty, we feel deeply. Our profession also suffered, for the hope of education is in persons of the caliber of John Holmes and John Wagner. In this hour we extend our deepest sympathy to Margaret Holmes and Margaret Wagner and their families. We stand by to help in any way we can.

the School Board and that he is not available for comment. "While both of your replies purport to give affirmative answers to the three questions, the letters are similar in giving at some length your several and sundry reasons why an affirmative answer would not necessarily apply.

"We note with interest the statement in one letter that the candidate reserves the right to personally decide on the issues after assuming office. In this stand we cannot concur, as the League believes that any candidate should be willing to make public his position on the important issues before the election. It is our opinion that the issues involved are of first importance. "The Voters' League is disturbed to note in the other letter the statement that under certain circumstances the candidate 'would consider it a responsibility of the Board to proceed with construction plans.' This would seem to refer to construction of the intermediate school, which we had concluded on the basis of Dr. Linn's report, had been abandoned.

"This statement is of concern to the Voters' League because the League feels that through its efforts a healthy interest in our schools has been aroused and, if we are to continue to make progress and the voters are to remain articulate, it is important that they have representative membership on the Board in complete sympathy with their wishes and objectives.

"The Voters' League also feels that the voters should be afforded a selection of candidates who represent all sides of the issues involved. Only in this way can we obtain a truly representative School Board.

"Because it believes in an open election which gives the voters a choice of candidates, each of whom is willing to announce his definite position on the major issues, the League will seek to assist in obtaining additional candidates."

If we lose, then you already know that mayonnaise pastry is just plain delicious. If you haven't tried it yet, make up a pan of golden colored Cookie Crisps today and serve with a colorful summer fruit salad made of apples, oranges and bananas. Another time, add a little grated cheese to mayonnaise pastry and roll out to fit a pie plate. Bake. Fill with any sweetened fresh fruit and there you have pie at its very best. This recipe for Mayonnaise Pastry Crisps, originating in the Best Foods' consumer kitchens, will also make two pie shells.

Mayonnaise Pastry Crisps 2 cups sifted flour 3 tablespoons 1/4 teaspoon salt water 1/2 cup real mayonnaise

Sift flour and salt into mixing bowl. Cut in real mayonnaise with pastry blender or two knives until crumbs are formed. Add water and stir with a spoon to form ball of soft dough. Roll out to 1/4 inch thickness and cut with a scalloped edged cookie cutter. (For a novelty, cut out center and bake, replacing center before serving.) Place on cookie sheet and bake in hot oven (425°F.) 8 to 10 minutes. Yield: approximately 3 dozen.
