Mayonnaise Pastry Crisps 2 cups sifted flour 3 tablespoons

mayonnaise Sift flour and salt into mixing bowl. Cut in real mayonnaise with pastry blender or two knives until crumbs are formed. Add water and stir with a spoon to form ball of soft dough. Roll out to 1/4 inch thickness and cut with a scallop edged cooky cutter. (For a novelty, cut out center and bake, replacing center before serving.) Place on cooky sheet and bake in hot oven (425°F.) 8 to 10 minutes. Yield: approximately 3 dozen.
