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

A few years ago, many of our Washington statesmen were verbose in their denunciations of one Dr. Joseph Goebbels and his manipulations of both truths and lies for propaganda purposes. It was fashionable at that time to issue sonorous pronouncements to the effect that "the democratic way" was to tell the people the truth, and further, not to keep the truth from them.

The following excerpts from Goebbels diary (which, incidentally, have been quoted before in this column) explain the Nazi concept of how the truth should be told or censored for propaganda purposes: the facts and to impresse the

... we must ask ourselves whether publication at this moment will have a favorable or unfavorable effect. That is a matter which only our Ministry can decide in the end."

Voters' League, Dist. 108

After consulting with the more than 20 prospective School Board candidates who were proposed or who volunteered to run, the District 108 Voters' League nominating committee decided unanimously that the selection of candidates should be based not only upon the fact that they were personally qualified, but especially upon their position on the vital issues, their special abilities, and their records of civic activity, it was announced today by Frederick J. Halton, Jr., committee chairman.

He reported that in consulting with the prospective candidates minded that the program of its leaders was endorsed by over 3,000 petition signers last fall and that their reports on the local firmed in the impartial survey by Dr. H. H. Linn, Columbia University expert. The League's officers were urged to carry forward their plans for consolidation of what Dr. Linn called the local "crazy-quilt pattern" of school districts and to accept. school Board nomination as a civic responsibility consistent with their present leadership, Halton stated.

The importance of having one candidate who is a tax authority with expert legal ability, another with special ability as an engineer and construction expert in case of any building program, and a third candidate representative of local business and the younger citizens and veterans guided the League in making its nominations, Halton announced.

The League has therefore selected Lerentz B. Knouff, 1011 Marion Avenue, a prominent attorney, as its candidate for President of the School Board. Mr. Knouff is a tax authority and a partner in the law firm of Holmes, Dixon, Knouff, and Potter. As a member of the Highland Park Traffic Commission he has been particularly interested in providing improved safety measures for Highland Park school children. Knouff has taken a very active part in the program to establish school situation in District 108.

As candidates for membership on the School Board, the League has chosen Raymond C. Warner, 735 S. Sheridan Road, and Gordon E. Clavey, 2041 Clavey Road. Mr. Warner is chairman of The District 108 Voters' League, and is an outstanding engineer. He is a vice-president and head of the Chicago office of the M. H. Detrick Company, nationally known engineering firm.

Gordon Clavey is a member of one of Highland Park's oldest families and is a prominent leader in
