"Lend An Ear," Refreshing, Fast, Funny Tuneful, Reaches Chicago

"Lend An Ear," the smash hit musical which played to New York theatre audiences for 58 solid capacity weeks, is coming to Chicago on Monday, March 27, when it will set up house at the Great Northern Theatre for a limited engagement. The all-star cast is headed by John Beal, star of stage, screen and radio, and includes Dorothy Babbs, Ellen Hanley, Jenny Lou Law, William Skipper, Gloria Hamilton, Al Checco, Peter Conlow, Robert Dixon, Gary Fleming, Antoinette Guhke, Hal Hackett, Margaret Jeanne, Sybil Lamb, Sid Lawson, Don Little, Florence Lord, Calvin Lowell, Rica Owens and Tafi Towers.

"Spicy," "smart," "sophisticated" and "saucy" are the adjectives which trip off the tongue of audiences and critics in labeling "Lend An Ear." The satirical skits constantly hit a high level in this lively revue, which is attractively staged, with fresh and fetching dance routines deftly devised by Gower Champion.

There is such a topical number as "Words Without Song," a burlesque on high opera which spoofs the staid Diamond Horseshoe section of the Metropolitan Opera House on Broadway. Another is "The Gladiola Girl," an hilarious lampoon of the 1925 musical comedy, throwing the spotlight on such popular dance crazes of that era as the Charleston and the Black Bottom.

The lilting and hummable music includes such Hit Parade numbers as "Molly O'Reilly," "Who Hit Me?", "When Someone You Love Loves You," and "Give Your Heart A Chance To Sing."

Charles Gaynor wrote the sketches, lyrics and music. Hal Gerson directed. Costumes, settings and lighting are by Raoul Pene DuBois. Gower Champion, the noted choreographer, conceived and staged the dances as well as staging the overall production.

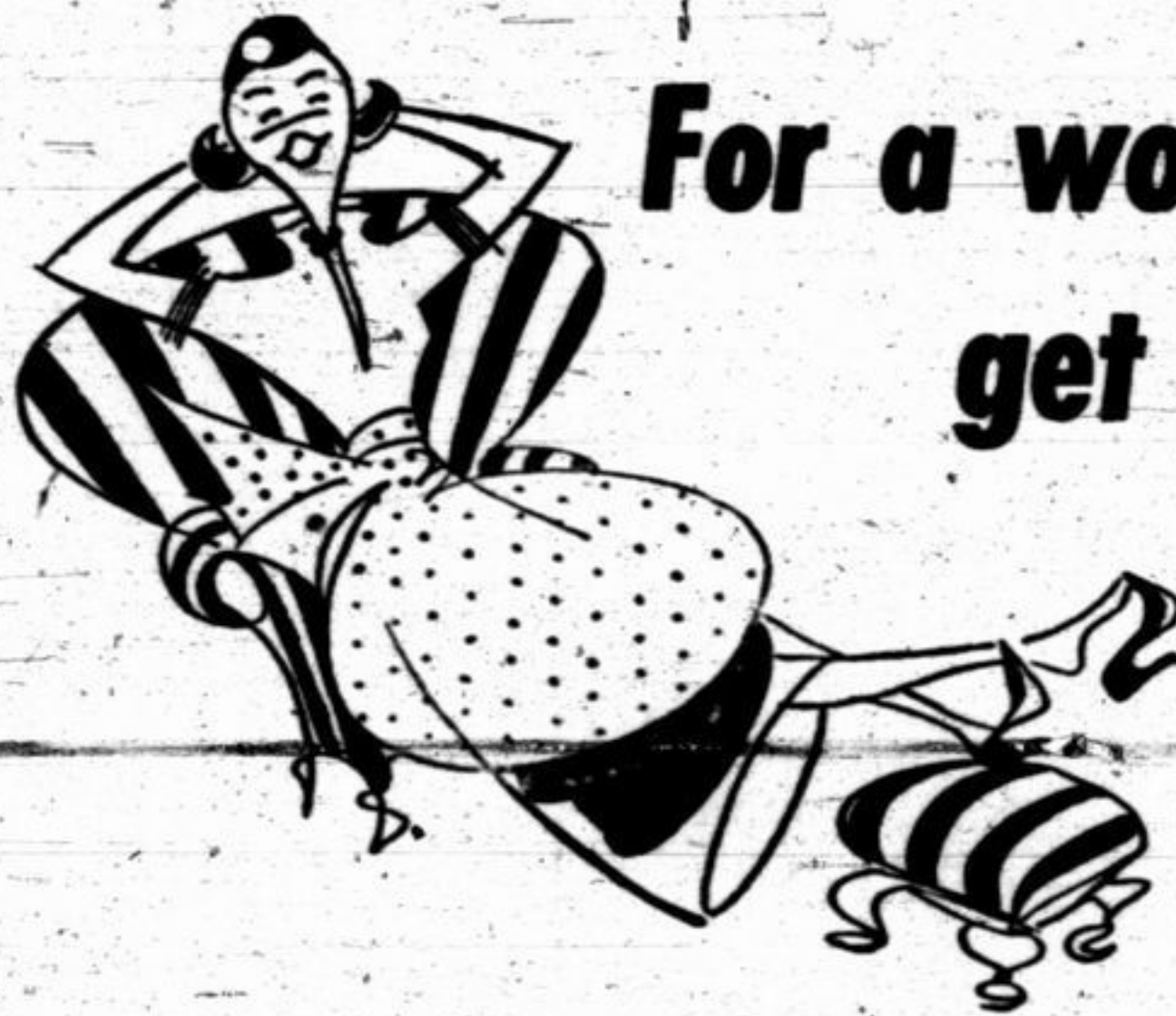

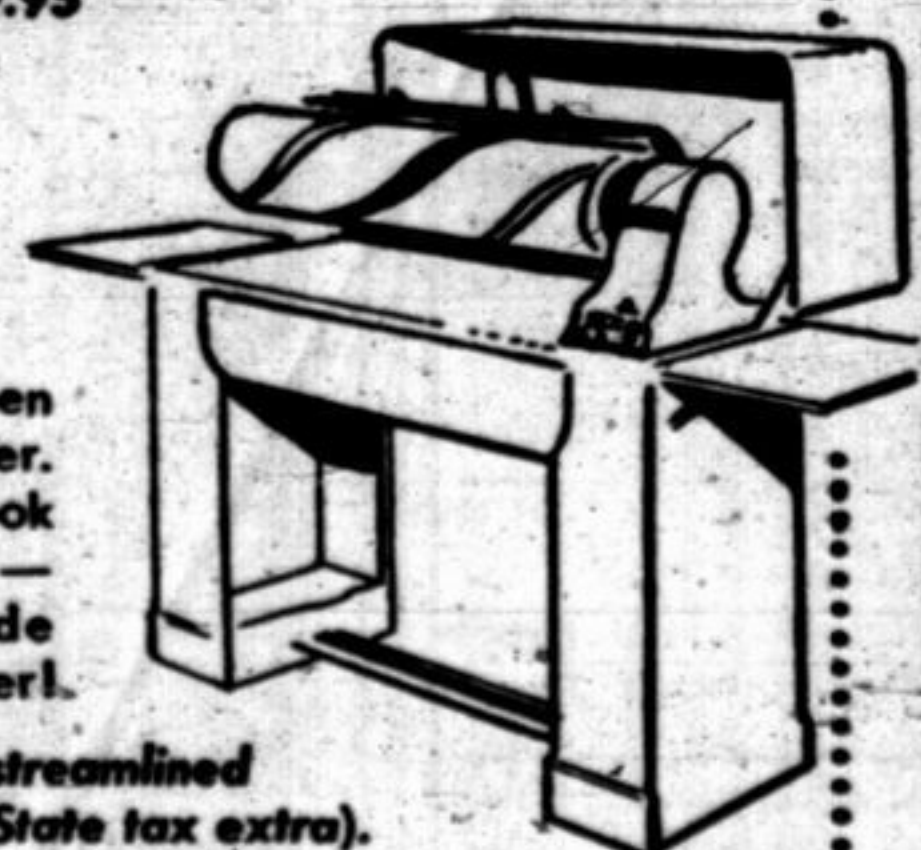
